MORLANCOURT

With the American Army on the Vesle, Thursday, Aug. 8.—In their offensive since July 18 the Allies have regained approximately 1,500 square kilometres.

More than 200 villages and towns, including Soissons, Chateau Thierry and Fismes, are again in the hands of the Allies. The front has been shortened by 53 kilometres (about 33 miles).

According to information contained in documents in possession of the French and to cross the Marne between Dormans and Chateau Thierry. Information gathered by the Allies is to the effect that in falling back the Germans brought into action at least seventeen divisions before reaching the Vesle. Additional reinforcements have been brought up since the Vesle was crossed. A division which was resting in Flanders is known to have reached the region north of Fismes on Tuesday.

DUE TO COMMAND CANADIANS AND AUSTRALIANS TAKE THOUSANDS OF PRISONERS
