

DISCUSS ELEVATION OF G. T. R. TRACKS

Another Term For Little Will
Solve Workingman's Prob-
lems, Say Citizens.

At a meeting of the citizens' committee held at headquarters Tuesday night, the daily inconvenience caused residents of that area between High-bury avenue and Egerton street, and south of the Grand Trunk tracks was discussed.

In addition to work on track elevation and grade separation this year Mayor Little, Ald. Seabrook and Ald. Watkinson, together with the industrial commissioner and city engineer, met a committee of representatives of the largest industries in the annexed district, with a view to securing access for the people working in factories north of the Grand Trunk from their homes, which are largely situated in the Hamilton road district. Following this conference the engineer reported to the city council on the cost of a footbridge at Ashland avenue or Children's street. His plans were sent to the Grand Trunk and at the request of the company were somewhat amended to meet its convenience. These plans are now in the hands of the Grand Trunk engineers again, and Mayor Little has promised that the bridge will be made next year whereby access for foot traffic at least may be given between Egerton street and High-bury avenue.

This break in a 4,300-foot continuous stretch of blockade should mean a saving of at least fifteen minutes to numerous citizens in that district on every trip to or from work. It is, of course, in addition to the work along the lines of track elevation, as this district is beyond the area included in the track elevation scheme to which Mayor Little has devoted a great deal of time and effort.

FEW IN ATTENDANCE ELECTION MEETINGS

Flock of Candidates Air Their
Views On Civic Matters.

Although there was not a score of persons present at the election meeting in Chesley avenue school last night, the session was a fairly lively one. Aldermanic candidates and nominees for other offices spoke, including the Labor majority candidate, H. B. Ashplant, John Cottam and School Trustees Edwin Smith and David Eggett.

Those who had followed civic matters closely were surprised when John Cottam came out unreservedly in support of Mr. Ashplant. He claimed that the mayor had blocked town planning measures in defiance of the people and the council. The reason for the measure was held up because the moneyed interests of the city feared that if it was put in operation public buildings would be moved from Dundas street to Wellington or Waterloo streets, he asserted. Mr. Ashplant was the clearest, sweetest, truest man who ever trod in shoe leather, he said.

Mr. Ashplant attacked the mayor's advertising campaign of last election and his refusal to appear on a public platform. He also criticized the cutting in half of the playgrounds appropriation voted by people and the granting of \$55,000 to Western University. He contended there was no reason why 1921 should be a year of unemployment. This was up to the employers of labor.

Ald. John Ashton, who is again a candidate in ward 3, spoke briefly, asserting that he was a law abiding citizen and it was only through workingmen that the working people could get what they needed. He also attacked the high school and believed that playgrounds should be provided for smaller children in preference to the larger ones. No. 2 committee, of which he was a member, did more work during the year than any other committee, he said. In 1920 they paid to pave many streets to the city limits, if storm-sewers are completed first.

John G. Mothersall, labor candidate for alderman in ward 3, criticized the council for placing measures in the London bill which had been turned down by the electors. He believed the city should have a hospital and a home for incurables should be supported, but was opposed to the motor-bus by-law.

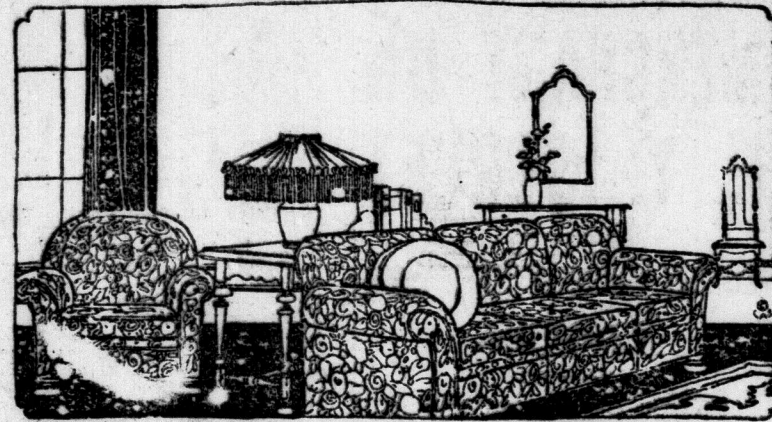
For Community Service.
Max Lerner, another ward 3 aldermanic candidate, who is a member of the field to give community service. He contended that the best of the labor movement were not at stake in municipal matters to the extent they are in provincial and federal elections, and that he was well qualified to represent the workers, as he had endured hardships himself and understood their circumstances.

John Cummings, labor candidate for the board of education, favored a central collegiate on the old site. He also urged further school reorganization, better use of the buildings after school hours, and free text books.

Trustee Edwin Smith, who is not a candidate this year, spoke in favor of a central collegiate. He said he was endorsed by Trustee David Eggett.

Mrs. W. W. Smith, who is not a candidate, also spoke. Several other women were among those present.

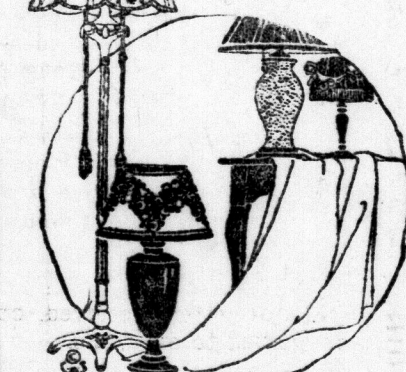

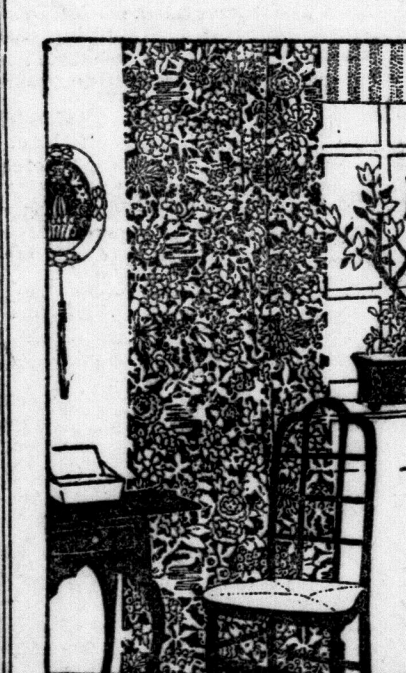

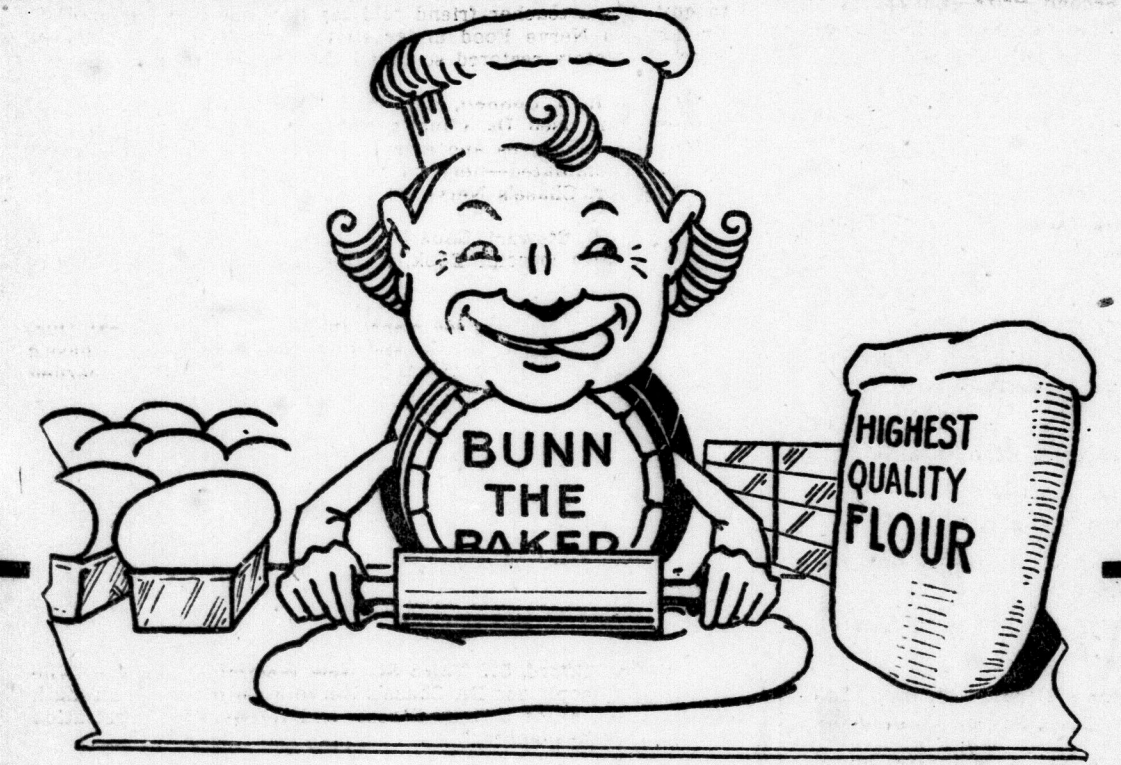
