Everything Smooth.
All the departments are running very smoothly, and the commanding officer reports the staff are doing excellent work. The pathological department is thoroughly equipped and doing good work, and this has been recognized by the fact that it has been charged with the duty of examining and making reports for all the Can-

Already the dental department has treated 1223 cases. In the surgical division 372 cases have been admitted. There have been operations for the removal of bullets, shrapnel and high explosive missiles, and the adjustment of irreducible fractures. Progress of recovery from wounds had been rapid. The nose and throat department has dealt with some sixty cases. The medical department has dealt with 264 cases.

**Hundred and One, Formerly
Reported Missing, Located
as Prisoners.**

Not So Many Killed and Wounded Reported Yesterday.

The casualty list announced yesterday was much higher than for some days past. Altko the list contained the names of 115 men who went overseas with Toronto units, yet 101 of these were previously reported missing, but have since been located in German prison camps. Of the remainder, two have been killed, one is wounded and prisoner, one is missing and one is wounded.

Pte. Gordon Paul has been killed in action, according to a report from the War Office. Mrs. J. Grant, 81 Summerhill avenue. He left Canada with draft of the 52nd Battalion, and has been reported two times as missing. He was engaged in real estate business in Port Arthur when war broke out.

Pte. Norman Brown, 1000 Dundas street, Pte. Noble Sproule, 14 Sullivan street has been killed in action. His twin brother, Pte. Hugh Sproule, 1000 Dundas street, is still in Germany, and another brother, Pte. Goldwin Sproule, is also on the firing line.

Pte. J. Smith, who enlisted with the 85th Battalion in June, 1915, he has been wounded. He is an Englishman and has only been in Toronto a short time, though he enlisted.

Justice Riddell Refuses to Quash Conviction Against Keepers.

In a judgment handed down at Osgood Hall yesterday, Mr. Justice Riddie refused to quash the conviction of Max Merben and Abraham Danielson, who were sentenced to thirty days in the County Jail for a nuisance on St. Patrick street. The premises in question are known as the City Social Club, and are situated on the corner of the dues of 50 cents per month. The place has conveniences for the playing of cards and dominoes.

His lordship says in his decision: "The attention of the attorney-general was called to the fact that the club that proper proceedings be taken for the abatement of this nuisance."

The attorney-general, Mr. J. H. Brown, and the County of Carlton has been given by Mr. Justice Rutherford the right to sue the defendants, who are a County Township farmer. Unless the parties agree upon some different method of settling the matter, the court is instructed to assess the damages. 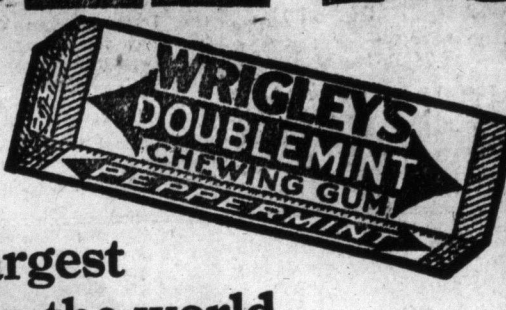
