McPherson reports: "The hospital is now running full strength and is in excellent condition." He adds that the hospital is not a convalescent hospital, but that it is receiving all manner and class of cases direct from the firing line, numerous cases arriving the day after the men are wounded. There are now seven auxiliary hospitals with a capacity of nearly four hundred, which have been placed under the Orpington Hospital. Patients are arriving daily, and are being discharged either cured or forwarded to these auxiliary hospitals. For instance, on July 5th 200 patients were discharged, leaving 900, and at neon one hundred more were received and later on a fresh convoy arrived bringing the number up to 1035.

Hundred and One, Formerly Reported Missing, Located as Prisoners.

LIST WAS LIGHT

So Many Killed an Wounded Reported Yesterday.

The casualty list announced yesterday was much higher than for some days past. Altho the list contained the names of 113 men who went overseas with Toronto units, yet 101 of these were previously reported missing, but have since been located in German prison camps. Of the remainder, two have been killed, one is wounded and a prisoner, one is missing and one, is wounded.

Justice Riddell Refuses to Quash Conviction Against Keepers.

In a judgment handed down at Osgoode Hall yesterday, Mr. Justice Riddle refused to quash the conviction of Max Merben and Abraham Daniels, who were sentenced to thirty days for keeping a disorderly house on St. Patrick street. The premises in question are known as the City Social Club, which has about 65 members, who pay dues of 50 cents per month. The place has conveniences for the playing of games of chance.
