NEW YORK, April 23.—Heavy and persistent selling pressure was again highly effective during Saturday's two-hour session, the recess of the preceding day merely accentuating the extent of the liquidating movement. Trading was far the largest of any recent week-end, approximately 600,000 shares being traded in, more than half of which represented the output of the final hour, when the list was almost without semblance of support.
