EXTRACT FROM THE REPORT OF THE REV. J. BREADING, BEAVER HARBOR,
EASTERN SHORE.

This Mission is of wide extent and somewhat indefinite limits, containing about 1,950 souls, of whom about 1,120 are Church members, young and old. The communicants number 108. There is a glebe of 87 acres belonging to the Church, but at present unproductive; also, a parsonage house, the value of which, to the occupant, is about £20 per annum. The people contribute in general about £43 10s. a year to educational purposes.

The number of baptisms by the Missionary in 1860 was 76; burials, 16.

In the Mission there are four Churches finished, and the frame of a fifth on the site, beside which there are 11 stations attended by the Missionary.

The services in the Churches are, once in every third Sunday. Two stations regularly served every Sunday.

The numbers present vary, according to the locality, from 20 to 150, and are represented as very attentive.

The Missionary paid 451 parochial visits in 1860. The number confirmed at the last Episcopal visit was 51. There are four Sunday Schools, but much difficulty is found in procuring persons qualified to conduct them in some parts of the Mission.

There are also 5 day schools in connexion with the Church, 3 of which are deeded to the D. C. S.

The Missionary (who has been obliged to leave this arduous duty) thus recapitulates his work in 1860:—

RECAPITULATION.

By the hand of an over-ruling and preserving Providence I have been mercifully spared to see the close of the past, and the commencement of the present year, in which I have been graciously sustained in health and vigor, notwithstanding all the fatigue of body and anxiety of mind requisite to be called into action in attending to the daily duties of this extensive parish. For these favors and all others I desire to thank God, and still take courage to work on, even unto the end of my pilgrimage, trusting that I am not laboring in vain in the vineyard of my Lord and Master. In having to accomplish those duties, I see, by my diary, I have travelled within the past year on Missionary duty above 2500 miles, including journeys to Halifax to attend the Diocesan Synod, and to P. E. Island on furlough.

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
