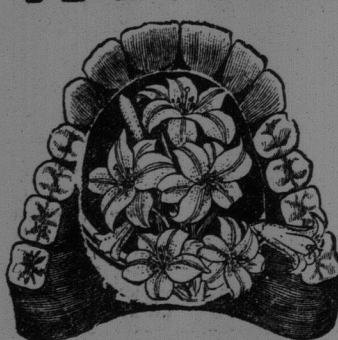

## HAS DONE MUCH TO BOOM CITY

Secretary Anderson of the Board of Trade Has Ideas and Energy

Eight Years Connected With the Board and Has Seen Membership Greatly Increased and Work Made More Effective—Some of His Plans

Prominent among those who are working for the bigger and busier St. John is the energetic secretary of the board of trade, W. E. Anderson. Since he entered the service of the board, eight years ago, on his return from South Africa, whither he went as a volunteer in the Boer war, Mr. Anderson has endeavored in every way possible to boom St. John as the commercial centre of eastern Canada.

On entering the office of the board, he was assistant to the late P. O. Allison and about six years ago, when Mr. Allison

died, he succeeded him as secretary. At that time the board had a membership of only 145, while now there are 285 members. The campaign conducted last year resulted in sixty names being added.

Previous to the present advertising committee being appointed, Mr. Anderson evolved and carried out some very effective advertising schemes. Probably the most successful of these was the issuing of a winterport circular showing St. John's position and means of communication with the industrial centres of the world. These circulars were distributed to more than 2,000 newspapers and trade papers, all of which gave excellent notices. There were also distributed some 10,000 small circulars and a large quantity of special advertising stamps. A special circular showing the importance of St. John as a manufacturing centre was sent to manufacturers in Great Britain. Practically all the correspondence leaving the office contains matters relating to St. John and referring to the board.

Mr. Anderson was successful in interesting the manufacturers in the idea of having photographs of their plants and products taken, and the collection of views which now adorn the walls of the board room have called forth many favorable comments.

Speaking of the work of Secretary Anderson, in his address at the recent annual meeting of the board, ex-President Foster said that much of the success of the board was due to his activity and energy. "He was the right man in the right place," he was anxious to start an advertising campaign in the interests of the citizens and it was to be hoped the citizens would support the plan.

One of the first moves of the new president was the appointment of an advertising committee, and this committee is now working out plans for an effective booming of St. John.

## ST. JOHN MAN BADLY HURT IN ELYRIA

Red Hot Iron Pierces R. A. Dickson's Foot—Pythians Show Brotherhood

Word has been received from Elyria, Ohio, that a serious accident happened there on Tuesday, January 4, to R. A. Dickson, a former resident of St. John. Mr. Dickson formerly worked as a roller in the Portland Rolling Mills, here and some years ago went to Elyria, with his family. While working in the Elyria tube mill, a red hot piece of steel tubing pierced his right foot. The injury was very painful, and Mr. Dickson has since been confined to his bed.

Mr. Dickson, who is about forty-five years of age, is a member of Union Lodge No. 2, Knights of Pythias, of this city and word of the accident was sent to the local lodge by Chevalier Lodge of Elyria. The local organization immediately wired the lodge where to do everything necessary for his comfort, and to secure a nurse if required, sending the bills here.

The committee in charge of organizing for the collection to be made for the deficit on the Seamen's Institute on Jan. 29, 27 and 28, report that they are meeting with much success. It is hoped to raise the entire \$1,400 required.
