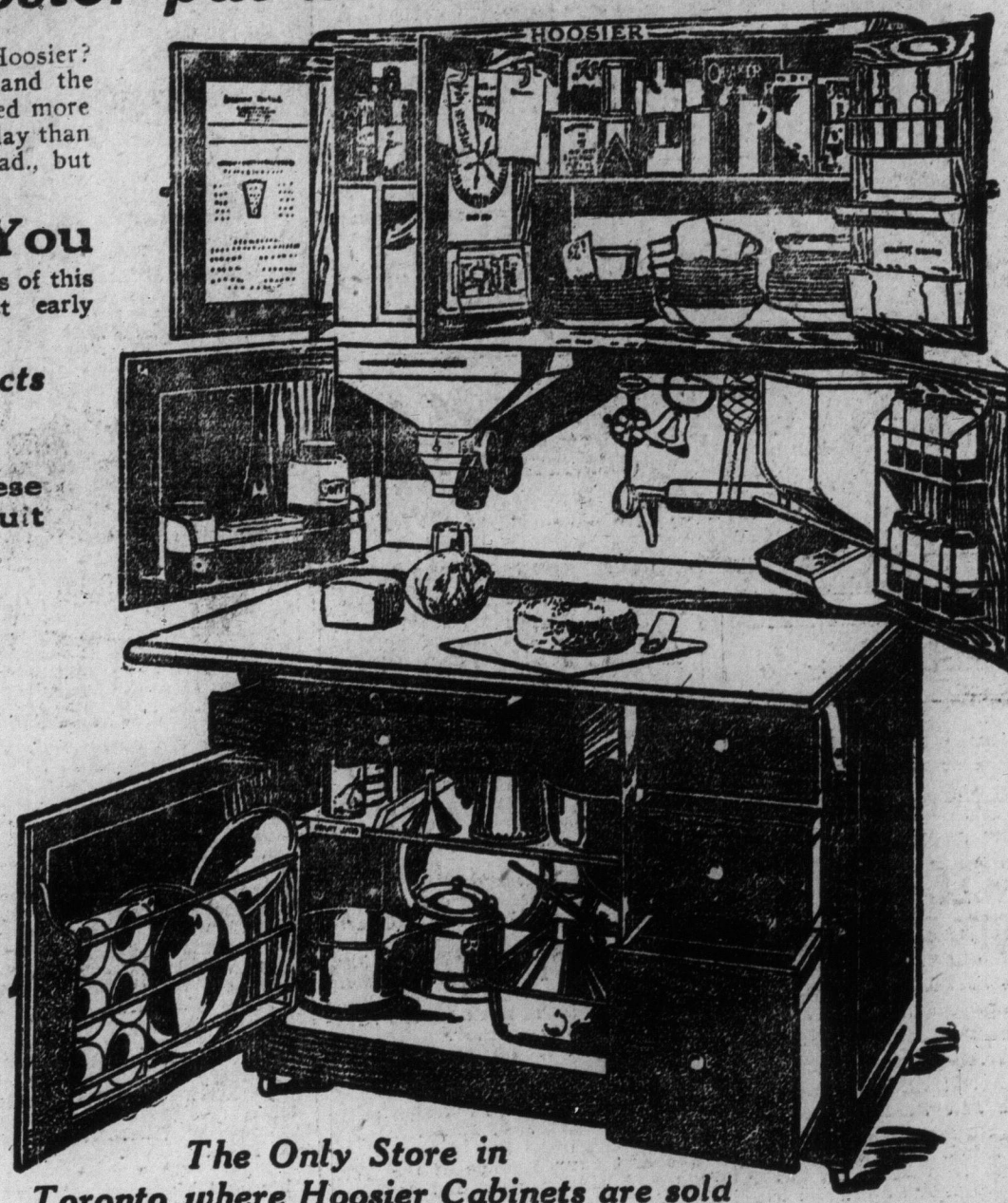

SALVAGE OF BRITISH VESSEL HAS BEEN ABANDONED.

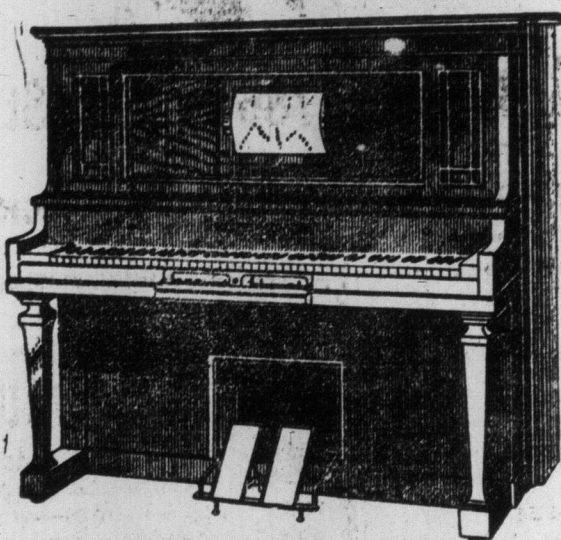
ST. THOMAS, Dutch West Indies, April 11.—Abandonment of the British steamship *Croydon*, which went ashore on April 6 off Barbuda Island, was decided on today. The 150 tons of dynamite forming part of the cargo was salvaged, but the coal on board was lost. The ship's officers and crew are all well and will return to England shortly, with the exception of the captain who remains at Antigua to give evidence at the inquiry into the wreck to be held by Lloyd's.

That nothing is of avail against the most dreaded disease but the speedy use of the knife was the opinion advanced by Dr. William H. Mayo of Rochester, Minn. Operation is the only cure, but radium or ray treatment is in order as a temporary palliative, where operation is impossible, according to Dr. Francis G. Wood, director of cancer research at Columbia University. Failures from radium outnumber the cures one hundred to one he stated. Another generation will be required to furnish knowledge on the real cause and actual nature of cancer, he said. Experiments for thirty-five centuries show that heredity plays a small part, if any at all, in its appearance. It was expected that the members of the society would have something hopeful to report of their investigations. Instead, they admitted no progress and held out little hope. They united in saying they had discovered neither the cause nor the nature of cancer. Then they proved by statistics that cancer is on the increase. That a change in the habits and customs may reduce the disease to some extent was a ray of hope held out by Dr. Mayo, who also said any cancer could be cured if operated upon in its early stages. "If we could only tell how to avoid it I would be glad, because I do not know," he declared. He said the statement that the use of meat was one of the habits to be avoided in connection with cancer prevention had been wrongly attributed to him.

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CANCER CANNOT BE CURED BY RADIUM

Leading Surgeons at Meeting Say Speedy Use of Knife is Only Hope

NEW YORK, April 11.—All hope of curing cancer by radium has been abandoned by some of the foremost surgeons and research workers of the country, who declared at last night's meeting of the American Society for the control of cancer that the failures of radium outnumber the cures 100 to 1.

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REBEL ATTACK ON TAMPICO WEAKENS

Federal Commander Declares He Can Now Hold Out Against Assault

VERA CRUZ, April 11.—An official report sent by the commanding officer at Tampico, General Zaragoza, to the minister of war thru this port, says that he had to face a severe attack from the rebels several days ago, but since then the attacks have been very weak, diminishing in force each day. He reports that only four federals were wounded, and none killed, but that he is exceedingly short of ammunition. General Zaragoza states that the gunboats *Zaragoza* and *Vera Cruz* have done admirable work in keeping the main body of the rebels from assaulting the town, and also that General Corona, who was ordered from Cardenas to reinforce him, has failed to arrive. He adds that Corona is not now expected as communications have been cut. He believes that he can get along without reinforcements, as he has been able to hold his own so far, the rebels failing to gain any ground.

AUSTRALIA HARD AFTER EMIGRANTS

Canada's Chief Competitor Displaying Indiscriminate Zeal

LONDON, April 11.—The activities of the emigration authorities of Canada and Australia afford a very interesting contrast just now. Canada is looking more and more to the ranks of countrymen for new citizens, and while relaxing no effort in this direction looks a little coldly on the temporary affection of the townsman for life on a Canadian farm. Indeed, not a little grumbling is heard at the difficulties a man without money experiences in getting permission to land in Canada. The result is that the steamships are not sailing fully booked to Canada, the settlers who are going, can properly be termed "handpicked." Australia on the other hand is zealously seizing on the temporary lull in the popularity of emigration to strengthen her work almost indiscriminately. An energetic campaign has been commenced to secure those classes which Canada regards as undesirable for the moment by reason of their inexperience. Town boys are being accepted with alacrity and a program has been prepared to attract the townsman to take up farms with the assurance that previous farm experience is unnecessary.

Canada's demand for domestic servants is reported in Australia, but the Canadian authorities were never bold enough to resort to such measures to satisfy that demand as have been adopted by those of Australia. S. Heath and Tooting are names of suburbs always associated with respectability and peace, but their atmosphere was charged with a high tension the other day in consequence of the carrying out of an idea to secure cooks. Australia wanted cooks badly. What could be simpler than to write to the cooks in each of the houses in these districts after the manner of a manufacturer who wants to popularize his soap or stone polish? One morning a shoal of letters were delivered addressed to "the cook" and the communication detailed all the advantages of life under the Southern Cross, and particulars of reduced fares, high wages, in short everything that a cook desiring to go to Australia would want to know. There was instant anger among the mistresses who found a point of argument in the fact that the letters were franked by the post-office.

PLUNDERING IMMIGRANT ENDANGERS MANY LIVES

While Robbing Baggage on Liner, He Causes Explosion and Fire

NEW YORK, April 11.—Sleeping passengers on the steamship *Vauban* approaching New York early today off Sandy Hook were aroused by an explosion in the baggage compartment of the steerage. Fire followed the explosion, but was quickly extinguished. Investigation showed that a Syrian, rifling the baggage of a fellow immigrant, had opened a box of cartridges and in so doing set them off. He was badly burned. The *Vauban* came from South American ports and carried, among other passengers, Colonel G. D. Roper and several members of the Hittite Manufacturers' Association, returning from a trip to South American cities.

HUMORISTS MERRY AT THUNDERER'S EXPENSE

London Times Described As a Supplement to Comic Cuts.

LONDON, April 11.—Nothing funnier has happened in this country—in the memory of the oldest inhabitant than the booming that has accompanied the drop in the price of the *London Times*, probably the most famous newspaper in the world, from two pence (or four cents) to a penny (or two cents). For many years, or a comparatively few months ago, the price of "The Thunderer," as it is affectionately called, was three pence, but in competition with the cheaper and infinitely livelier *London newspapers* (most of which are now sold for a halfpenny, or one cent), *The Times* lost or to such an extent that Lord Northcliffe, who owns *The Daily Mail*, *Answers*, and no end of other periodicals, including one called *Comic Cuts*, which is popular among errand boys, as well as *The Times*, dropped the price to twopenny. This is now followed by a still more revolutionary drop, which has led to the natural question: "Will *The Times* eventually be sold at a halfpenny?" It would have been more sensible to

have faced the situation squarely. Instead, however, the following portentous announcement (drafted, apparently by someone wholly without a sense of humor) appeared in the newspaper: "In view of the grave importance of the present political situation, the price of *The Times* will be reduced on Monday next to one penny."

This remarkable pronouncement has been received with the mirth which might have been expected, and has been everywhere parodied, by no one more amusingly than Ivan Heald, the funny man of *The Daily Express*, who produced a calendar of future alterations in the price of *The Times* as follows: "March 25.—Mr. Asquith plays golf with Mr. Redmond. Price of *Times* reduced to a halfpenny. "Easter"—Parliament not sitting. Price raised to threepence. "April 25.—Narrow escape of the government. *Times* sold next day at three for twopenny. "June 11.—Home rule bill comes up for third reading. Copy of *The Times* given away with *The Daily Mail* and *Comic Cuts*."
