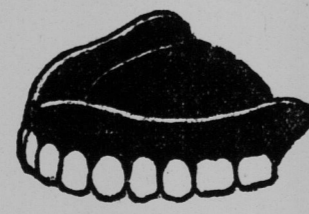

THE S.S. ORTHIA SAW ICEBERGS

Donaldson Liner Passed Several of Them on Voyage from Glasgow.

Donaldson line steamship Orthia, Captain Horsbury, arrived in port this morning from Glasgow with a large general cargo, among which are 28,832 bags Scotch hard coal. The steamer made the passage in eleven days, and had fine easterly weather most all the way across the Atlantic ocean.

On May 31st, during the voyage, she spotted the steamship Manchester Shipper on her way to Manchester from Montreal. On May 31st at 5:30 p. m., she passed a very large iceberg in lat. 47 41 north, lon. 50 44 west, and at 6:30 a. m. same date, a small berg awash in 47 33 north, 50 55 west, also at 9 p. m. passed another small berg in lat. 47 18 north, lon. 51 30 west, all of which are dangerous to navigation.

The many friends of Captain Horsbury in this city are giving him and his chief and second officer the glad hand today on their arrival at this port.
