He slashed Nelson with right and left hooks and pummeled his body. Nelson soon was bleeding and at the end of round eleven both men were crimson from a cut in the batter's lip.

Cubans Have Organized Teams There and Have Started to Play The Great Game

New York, April 18.—With discouraging comment on all sides as to the effect that war by this country will have on the continent and these men have organized baseball teams and started to play the great American game.

SMUTS COOL IN BATTLE

Directed Rufiji River Victory While Reading in Camp

London, April 18.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Thoroughness of preparation, coolness in execution, and scientific accuracy in the direction of artillery fire characterize modern battles as demonstrated in the last important conflict in the clearing of German East Africa by British forces, according to an account of the battle of Rufiji River as related by Reuter's special correspondent. This was the last campaign personally commanded by Major Gen. Jan Christian Smuts, the former Boer commander, and resulted in giving the British control of all the coast line and the inhabitable part of German East Africa.
For two weary months, writes Reuter's correspondent, the army lay upon its weapons, consolidating, reorganizing, rebuilding railway lines, piling up great dumps of food and ridding itself of its surplus. Then it moved forward from Morogoro to eject the enemy from his trenches on the Mgeta River and seize the passages of the Rufiji.

"WAKE UP, AMERICA" DAY IS PLANNED

April 19 Chosen For Big Patriotic Demonstration at Metropolis

New York, April 18.—Thursday, April 19, Saturday, April 21, will be the great mass meeting in New York state in the campaign for national defense. The movement to celebrate "Wake Up, America" day, on April 19, the anniversary of the battle of Lexington, originated here with the recruiting sub-division of the mayor's committee on national defense, and plans announced on Monday that date will set the pace for the whole country. April 21 has been designated by Gov. Whitman as agricultural mobilization day.
The principal event of the "Wake up, America" day programme will be a great mass meeting in Carnegie hall, lasting from 3 p.m. Thursday, until 8 a.m. on Friday. There will be patriotic addresses by prominent men, well-known actors and actresses will contribute to a vaudeville programme and more than 800 young society women will distribute programmes and flags.
Two street parades, in which more than 30,000 boys and girls will march, has been arranged by the Junior Patriotic Army and navy ships will show off the crowds with confetti and printed appeals for recruits. Patriotic labor meetings will be held as part of a campaign to obtain 10,000 men to man submarine chasers.

DAYLIGHT SAVING.

Editor Times:—
It has been stated in some quarters that the Daylight Saving plan is being opposed by the electric light people and the motion picture interests only. This is the direct opposite of the truth. So far as the motion picture houses are concerned the Daylight Plan interferes with their volume of business very little. Throughout the whole stretch of warm weather very light business is expected. Therefore my opposition from that quarter is not because of reduced receipts. The cause for complaint is tardiness in train arrangements with closely booked films and mix-ups over related telegrams, as most of the picture correspondence is done by wire. Among those opposing St. John's isolated position in this matter are the laboring people, the street car workers, the fishing interests, the school teachers (ask Dr. Bridges); the hotels, the cafes, the theatres, a large percentage of retail and wholesale business houses and thousands of suburbanites. However, there is a way to overcome all objections if everybody will co-operate pleasantly.
