COUNTY NEEDS MORE MONEY TOO

Estimates Submitted to Municipal Finance Committee Show Increases of About \$9,000

Estimates for 1917 were presented to the finance committee of the municipal council at a meeting yesterday afternoon at which Commissioner Wigmore presided.

There was some discussion as to whether the municipality should accept a grant of \$24,000 for the county tuberculosis hospital which has been offered by the provincial government, but the offer finally was accepted.

The more important items in the estimates are:
The chief 1917 appropriations that were passed were:
St. John County Hospital \$34,420.00
Children's Aid Society 3,000.00
General Public Hospital 47,125.00
Local Board of Health 8,125.00
Municipal Home 28,690.00

The appropriation for last year for the county hospital amounted to \$32,570. Running expenses and cost of maintenance for the twelve months just closed totalled \$38,000. To the \$34,420.00 granted for this year will be added the \$2,400 which is to be handed over by the government.

The Children's Aid Society, which received \$3,000 last year will get the same. The society had asked for \$4,500, but when they learned that the estimates were increased they reduced their request to the same figure as last year's grant.

The net increase in the general public hospital grant is about \$4,000; the increase for the Board of Health about \$1,500; and for the Municipal Home about \$1,200. The only salary increase is a raise for the county treasurer from \$800 to \$1,000.

The committee adjourned until this afternoon to hear a request for a new home for the hospital nurses.

GOOD BUILDING YEAR IN TOWN OF CAMPBELLTON

The year just closed has been an exceptionally good one in the building line in Campbellton.

Thirty-two building permits in all were issued during the twelve months. Most of these were for residences, there being twenty-eight.

These thirty-two permits represent an expenditure of nearly \$80,000, but as many of the values of residences were placed at ridiculously low figures, it is safe to say the total of buildings erected here during 1916 was well over the hundred thousand dollar mark.

The total number of permits issued in 1916 was thirteen, representing an expenditure of about \$18,000. This year shows an increase of over four hundred per cent.

Many of the residences erected during the past year were to rent at from \$10 to \$20 per month, a class of houses much needed here, where prospective residents were forced to live elsewhere through the lack of housing facilities. These in a position to judge state that 1917 will be quite active in the building line.
