WAR HAS SENT UP CANADA'S DEBT

Ottawa, July 9.—Canada's paying the penalty of the war in the shape of increased taxes and reduced expenditures. During June there was an increase of no less than \$1,970,000. The increase for the month of June was \$1,970,000, 806,068. The total net debt at the end of last month stood at \$400,287,721 or nearly \$80 per head.

The government's temporary loans on June 30 totalled \$100,540,800, nearly all of course, being in the London market. The total revenue for June was \$11,488,970, a decrease of \$694,258, as compared with June of last year, despite the increased tariff and the stamp taxes.

Customs revenue again showed a falling off, the total for the month being \$6,898,768, a decrease of \$144,861 as compared with June of last year, which was, in turn, much lower than for the preceding year.

Postoffice revenue, with the help of the additional stamp tax, shows a small increase but not up to expectations. The total postoffice revenue for last month was \$1,250,000, an increase of \$25,000 over June of last year.

For the past three months customs revenue has shown a decrease of \$497,128 and postoffice revenue an increase of \$750,000, as compared with the corresponding three months of last year.

Expenditures are remaining about the same as last year. For June, there was a decrease of \$498,447 in consolidated fund expenditure and an increase of \$629,784 in capital expenditure, as compared with June of last year.

The necessity of early imposing new taxes or considerably reducing expenditures will have to be faced by the government when the budget proposals are brought down next session.
