Thursday Afternoons Now Set Apart For Pre-school Age Clinic at Health Centre

For the convenience of the mothers and as a means of securing still larger attendance at the clinic at the Health Centre, arrangements have been made to change the date of the pre-school age clinic from Monday to Thursday afternoon as the well baby clinic is held at that time and mothers with children of the ages to attend these two clinics can bring them on the same day and save an unnecessary trip. The pre-school age clinic has had a steadily increasing attendance during the last few months, but if it is to carry out the important work it should accomplish in the city its attendance should be much larger still. At this clinic the children are weighed and examined. Many have to be referred to the care of the family physician and some are referred to the hospital. Some are recommended a change of feeding and some are found to need different routine. It is at the pre-school age that slight defects may be detected and remedied and the child, which might have been ailing throughout life, is prevented from meeting that unfortunate fate and through the carrying out of advice given, becomes a husky healthy citizen.

The well baby clinic each Thursday afternoon has had a fairly constant number in attendance, although the personnel of the young clients varies each week. More favorable weather has smiled on the well baby clinic in recent weeks and that has been a big factor in bringing up attendance. The pre-natal conferences are now held at the Health Centre only once a month instead of weekly and are conducted by the Victorian Order of Nurses. The expectant mothers are invited by the V. O. nurses and receive instruction and much helpful advice. There are also demonstrations given regarding the care of the baby and the correct garments. A cup of tea is served and the mothers have a social chat. In the pre-natal work a specially helpful series of letters is being distributed under the department of Health by Miss H. Dykeman, director of the Health Centre and of public health nursing services in the province. These letters were issued by the Canadian Council of Child Welfare and many of the sets have already been distributed through the Women's Institutes in New Brunswick.

Word of Advice To The Housewife On Buying of Eggs

When an interview with Federal Egg Inspector E. M. McKinnon on the proper method of buying eggs was published some days ago an inaccurate report in his advice is therefore published again. He said that, through the egg-grading system enforced by the Federal Government, eggs are divided into four classes—specials, extras, firsts and seconds.

FOUR CLASSES. Specials were eggs of uniform quality and weight; generally speaking they were not more than three or four days old. They were not on the market at all seasons and could only be obtained from special purveyors. The regular commercial market does not handle them.

Extras were a little smaller and older than specials. They could be obtained at all seasons on the commercial market.

Eggs graded as firsts might be used alone, but their flavor and texture were not so good as that of the higher grades.

Seconds were the lowest edible grade recognized. They were not uniform in appearance or flavor and their state was easily recognized.

Mossesohn, executive chairman of the Associated Dress Industries of America. Mr. Mossesohn is the arbiter of matters pertaining to women's apparel here. Problems of every nature in regard to women's dress are submitted to him from day to day, and it is through his office that many of the dictates of fashion are issued. "I think it is quite likely," he said, "that the extreme short skirt has gone as far as it will and that there will be a tendency toward longer skirts. This is not an opinion based merely upon personal likes and dislikes or upon a consideration of modesty, but it

is an opinion based upon the fashion cycle. In all probability skirts will never be long, at least in our own day. I do believe, however, that they will fluctuate between ten and fourteen inches from the ground, more or less from season to season. While we will always have with us, of course, those women and girls who delight in exaggerating a mode and we will always have with us those women who prefer to dress according to their own individual tastes for the most part I think that the trend of fashion will be along lines of moderation which will be desired by our women generally.
