DE MAR IS HAILED AS "SUPER-MAN" BY BOSTON PHYSICIANS

RESISTANCE OF FAMOUS RUNNER IS MARVELOUS

Information Gained in Tests Will Aid in Treatment of Ailments

BOSTON, July 3.—Clarence De Mar, widely-known marathon runner, whose daily dozen is 12 miles, has been tagged a "super-man" by a group of physicians at the Massachusetts General Hospital. The Mar, winner of the recent marathon classic at Baltimore, and three-time winner of the B. A. event, has been the object of a series of unique laboratory experiments at the hospital.

Under direction of Dr. Arnes V. Bock, physicians put the 40-year-old runner through heart, blood, pulse and respiration tests to determine what was responsible for his athletic prowess. Information which will advance the knowledge of treatment of persons afflicted with heart disease and kindred maladies is expected to be secured as a result of the experiments, according to Dr. Bock.

A stationary bicycle pedalling test was the basis of the preliminary experiments. The physicians themselves took the same test to afford a comparison between the stamina of De Mar and that of the average man.

Dr. Bock reported the tests already had proved that De Mar possessed a "marvelous power of resistance to a striking degree beyond what the normal man possesses."

TUNNEY ORDERED TO FIGHT IN NEW YORK

Challenger Must be in New York by July 15—Other Bouts Discussed

NEW YORK, July 3.—Another step toward the consummation of the Dempsey-Tunney meeting for the heavyweight championship was taken this week by Tex Rickard when he visited Tunney at his home in Hollywood, Cal., instructing him to begin training for Dempsey and to be in New York not later than July 15. At the same time it became known that Dempsey, who has been traveling in Nevada, Utah and Colorado, will be in New York around the first of August.

No information was forthcoming as to where Dempsey is going to train. In this regard, however, it was mentioned that Dempsey having no license to box in this State, he cannot train here and charge an admission to the bouts. It is believed that Dempsey will train in New York around the first of August.

The possibility of several good bouts in the near future was discussed at the result of two happenings at the Garden. The first was the rumor that Jimmy Slattery, Buffalo youngster, would meet Bob Sage in a star ten-round bout at the Buffalo next week. The other happening was the appearance of Harry Persson, the Swedish heavyweight, at the Garden.

He was photographed with him and then he decided he would fight for him. It is expected that the big Swede, who stands about 6 feet 3 inches and weighs 195, will be seen in action in about six weeks. Persson will probably be matched with Monte Munn, Napoleon Dorval, Jack De Mave or some other likely opponent.

BASEBALL PLAYERS DRAW SUSPENSION

Nine Amateurs Black Listed For Playing With The Independents

All former City and County League players who participated in independent amateur games at St. Peter's park on Thursday have been suspended indefinitely from the ranks of the M. P. B. A. A. U. of C. issued yesterday by S. F. Doyle, president, and J. G. Quigley, secretary, and received by W. E. Stirling, vice-president of the M. P. B. A. A. U. C. last night. Mr. Stirling further announced that he had received another bulletin signed by the same officials warning all amateur clubs and athletes not to compete with or against the Independents.

Mr. Stirling also remarked that the suspended athletes all came under the class B definition of an amateur and their applications, if made, for reinstatement into amateur ranks, could not be considered until the 1927 annual meeting of the C. A. A. U. C.

The official bulletins follow:

Bulletin S. J. No. 8

All amateur clubs and athletes registered or affiliated with the M. P. B. A. A. U. of C. are hereby warned not to compete with or against the St. Peter's and Vets' professional baseball teams. These teams are styling themselves as "Independent Amateurs." Any player or team competing with or against them will be indefinitely suspended.

BOXER SUMMONED TO COURT DROWNED

John Wlock Forgiven When Justice Learns He is Before Higher Judge

NEW YORK, July 3.—While the bell of Holy Cross Church in Maspeth, L. I., was tolling for the funeral of John Wlock, welterweight prizefighter, known in the ring as Fred Lock, his name was called for trial before County Judge W. Bernard Vause in Brooklyn on a charge of possessing a blackjack.

"I have been informed," Assistant District Attorney William X. Geoghan told the court, "that the defendant was drowned and has gone before the Supreme Judge of us all."

"That being the case," replied Judge Vause, "he stands forgiven by this court."

Wlock was a special policeman and believed he had a right to carry a blackjack. A uniformed patrolman, however, thought otherwise and filed a complaint against him.

CITY LEAGUE STRENGTHENED BY NEW TEAM

Water Department Takes First Series—Close Race Expected in Second

The St. Roses baseball team was last evening taken into the City League at a meeting of that organization held in the office of the president, A. W. Covey. The first section of the league, which consists of the games already played, has been won by the Water Department, last year's Maritime champions. The second section of the league will start this afternoon when the Water Department and Saint John's meet, on the East End grounds at 8 o'clock. The second game of this section will be played on the North End grounds Monday evening between St. Rose's and Trojans.

APPLICATION ACCEPTED

The application of St. Rose's for entry into the City League was accepted with the understanding that arrangements, suitable to the teams in the league before St. Rose's entry, be made. The St. Rose's by virtue of their winning the City and County League, and the Water Department, by winning the first section of the City League, will be eligible for the city championship playoffs.

The Water Department, on account of now holding the Maritime championship title, will participate in the final games of the city championships only. In other words, a winner must be declared among all other eligible teams and that winner will meet the Watermen for the pennant.

The lists of eligible players on all teams must be handed in before Monday night to the secretary of the City League.

BERESFORD MEETS GODDARD IN FINAL

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, July 2.—Two champions of last year's Henley will defend their titles in the finals tomorrow for the Diamond Sculls and the Grand Challenge Cup. They are Jack Beresford, jr., Thames club, title holder, and G. Goddard, Jesus College, Oxford.

Lady Margaret College, Cambridge, and Leander, present holders, will battle for the Grand Challenge Cup. This afternoon Jack Beresford eliminated T. Collett, Pembroke College, Cambridge, easily in 8 minutes 37 seconds. In the other semi-final Goddard eliminated E. W. Powell, the Eton schoolmaster, who won the sculls in 1912. Goddard's time was 8 minutes and 49 seconds. He finished one and a quarter length ahead of Powell.

In the Grand Challenge Cup semi-finals Leander defeated the Thames Club by half a length, in 6 minutes 49 seconds. Lady Margaret defeated London Rowing Club by three-quarters of a length in 7 minutes and 4 seconds.
