SOME REDUCTION IN HARDWARE
("Hardware and Metal" April 2)
The outstanding feature in the hard-ware markets this week is a new list showing lower prices on steel pipe and the reductions in prices of building papers and sheathings, covering practi-ally all tarred and dry fibres.

Other price reductions include sash cord, ship pulleys, wrapping twines, solder, plumbers' oakum, steel wool and oil cloth binding. Several lines of small tools have also been reduced in price. Scrap metals show lower quotations, and hot water boilers and radiators are showing a decline. Lined oil, shellac and rosin are slightly lower. Common cast irons are advanced in price slightly, and galvanized sheets show no change, and compression goods and lead products are also held. Ingot metals are irregu-lar with a few lines showing a decline. A former tone is evident in several of these on outside markets, and it is be-lieved that the bottom has been reached. The primary steel markets continue to show a decline in steel ingot produc-tion with prices of steel products hold-ing practically unchanged. Except for a decline in pig iron prices caused by ef-forts to reduce accumulated stocks, prices are maintained and there is less disposi-tion to quote concessions than a month ago.

Most wholesalers report a continued increase in business, with an improve-ment in sales, which show an increase over last month. A good feature is the larger number of mail orders being re-ceived from retailers and instructions to forward on goods which have been booked for later delivery, showing that the consuming demand is picking up.

HELD IN KINDLY MEMORY HERE
Mrs. R. T. Worden and Miss Gunn related how on Saturday, March 12, 1921, in Lexington, Mass., where they were, together with their brother, T. J. Gunn, in at-tendance at the funeral of George H. Black, another law. The Lex-ington Minute-Man, of April 1, has a very appreciative article relative to Mr. Brown who is held in kindly memory by many here. The article is in visits to his wife's relatives here. The Minute-Man says:—
George H. Brown, third son of the late Benjamin F. and Sarah Dalrymple Brown, passed away Saturday, March 26th, at his residence, 83 Hancock street, Lexington, after a week's illness. Mr. Brown was born in Charlestown, January 23rd, 1864. In 1876 his parents moved to Lexington, where they owned and occupied the beautiful estate on the corner of the beautiful street known as "Edgewood." The Brown family became leaders in the church and social life of the town and their influence was of great value to all the best interests, while their home was one of refinement and culture.
The deceased has since the death of his father in 1908, been head of the firm of B. F. Brown & Sons (Insur-ance), which for fifty years has oc-cupied a prominent place in the business of Charlestown, at 19 City Square. He was also of the firm of Kaler, Carney, Liffier & Co., 70 Kilby street, Boston.
In the social life of Lexington Mr. Brown was a member of the Old Bel-fry Club, the Men's Club of the Uni-tarian church, and Simon W. Robinson club. He was also a member of the membership of each organization.
On June 15, 1908, Mr. Brown married Mrs. Robert Brown, of St. John, N. B. Part of their married life was passed in Arlington, where the only child, Ronald, was born. He is now a student at the Institution of Technology, class of 1922. In their new home the family drew about them a circle of friends. The funeral was held Monday, at 3 o'clock, from the late residence on Han-cock street. The service was conducted by Rev. John M. Wilson and the at-tendance of such a large gathering of men attested to the respect for him who has been taken from our midst in what would seem the prime of life. He was a lovable companion and he drew many about him of both young and old because of his pleasing personality. The quantities of flowers spoke of the love of friends, relatives and business associates. Mrs. Agnes Wheeler gave beauty to the service as well as comfort to the family by her sympathetic playing of familiar hymns on the piano, previous to the service. The body was interred at Mt. Auburn.

The bearers were the three broth-ers of the deceased and the only son who, with the wife, survive him. The others are Frank Dalrymple Brown of Cambridge, treasurer of the Warren Institute for Savings; Fred Keyes Brown of this town, manager of the Dunker Hill branch of the American Trust Com-pany, and Willard Dalrymple Brown also of Lexington, a Boston architect.

RESCUE GIRL
Fleeing From Bolsheviks, She Fell Into Hands of Russian on a Maine Farm.

(N. Y. Times.)
That a girl immigrant in flight from the Bolsheviks in Russia has been held a prisoner and cut off from the outside world in this country for the last three years was disclosed yesterday by Miss Ruth Crawford, director of the Immigration Service of the National Board of the Young Women's Christian Association, 600 Lexington avenue.

After such an experience, Matilda G., a Lithuanian girl, has been recently re-leased from the complete donkey-riding of a Russian refugee and his wife on a farm near Maine. To Mary Daily-dale, a Lithuanian Y. W. C. A. worker, who acted upon information furnished by a peddler, whose suspicion had been aroused, belongs the credit of Matilda's new freedom. So complete was the sur-veillance by the couple that this girl, the daughter of a prosperous farmer, well educated and speaking two lan-guages, has lived in the United States three years, thinking that there was no food obtainable in this country other than bread, potatoes and beans and that a government "passport" was necessary to leave the farm or go to the next vil-lage.

The investigation discloses that after the outbreak of the Russian revolution a well educated Lithuanian farmer living in a Russian province entrusted his daugh-ter to her employer and his wife in 1914, said Matilda G. Crawford. "Pre-viously, in 1915, with her father, mother and sister, the girl had been among those forced to flee before the advancing German army. Making her escape later with the man and his wife across to Si-beria to the Pacific and eventually up to Maine, they settled on a farm near the town of Bangor. There was no food obtainable in this country other than bread, potatoes and beans and that a government "passport" was necessary to leave the farm or go to the next vil-lage.

When confronted with the evidence the employer offered no resistance. Ma-tilda is now to live at the International Institute, where she will soon begin to learn a trade.

"While it is an unusual case, Matilda is only one of the many foreign girls whom we are daily called upon to help."

REDUCED SALMON PACK FOR 1921
Early estimates of the salmon pack of British Columbia for 1921 indicate that the output will be of comparative-ly low proportion, the ratio running from 40 to 20 per cent, of normal. Con-sult General F. M. Ryder, of Vancouver, intimates that some canneries were pre-pared to put up about 25 per cent of their normal pack, while others are fig-uring only on 15 per cent. No "chums" will be canned in British Columbia dur-ing 1921, as there are said to be three-quarters of a million cases still in stock without a market. According to Mr. Ryder, canneries that with Japan put-ting 500,000 cases of redfish on the British market, Alaska canneries carry-ing over about 400,000 cases over the en-d of the year, for the first time in four or five years, and with the pack from the Columbia River and Puget Sound, there would be a gigantic total pack all rush-ing to the British market. Of the 615,288 hundredweight of canned salmon ex-ported from Canada during 1920, the United Kingdom took 310,451 hundred-weight.
