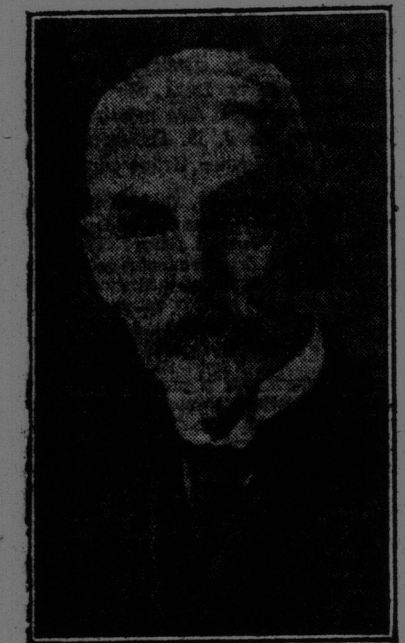


## FINE PORTRAIT OF DR. THOMAS WALKER WAS UNVEILED

Presented by Albion Lodge and Will Hang in Masonic Temple in Honor of Veteran Mason of More Than Fifty Years Standing.

A portrait of Dr. Thomas Walker which is to hang in the lodge room was unveiled and presented to Dr. Walker last night at a special meeting of Albion lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M., in the Masonic hall, at which Dr. J. G. Leonard, Worshipful Master, presided.

Dr. Walker was installed Worshipful Master of the lodge in the years 1877 and 1878 and subsequently in the years 1880 and 1897.

He was elected and served as Grand Master of the Grand lodge of New Brunswick in the years 1889, 1890, 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1897 and 1898.

In accepting the portrait, Dr. Walker thanked the lodge and expressed his appreciation of the gift. He also thanked the lodge on behalf of Mrs. Walker for the bouquet of roses presented to her.

After the presentation there were short addresses by Judge Forbes, P. G. M., and Dr. H. S. Bridges, P. G. M., and Canon Armstrong, Past Grand Chaplain. King Kelley, Past Master, St. John.

After the exercises in the lodge room, the members adjourned to the Temple club where a social hour was held at which refreshments were served.

### CONTINENTAL HIKERS.

Winnipeg, April 20.—J. A. Behan and Clifford Behan, father and son on a hike from Halifax to Vancouver, arrived here today at noon the eighty-fourth day of their trip from Halifax. They averaged twenty-six miles a day and expect to reach the Pacific Coast by the end of June or nearly a month ahead of their schedule. They will leave Winnipeg on Thursday night.

Charles Burkman, who left Halifax eight days ahead of the Behans is now 134 miles behind and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dill, the third party on the transcontinental hike, are now at Savanne (Ont.), half way across the continent.

## ACCEPT OFFER OF EMPLOYMENT

Chatham, N. B., April 20.—The employees of the Fraser Company's pulp mill here, members of Local 102 of the International Brotherhood of Sulphite Pulp and Paper Union, last night, by a secret ballot, voted by a majority of two to one to return to work on the schedule as given to them by the company on February 26. On that date the men turned down the proposal. They have been out of work since December 18, last. It is doubtful whether the mill will start up at present but there will probably be many men taken on for repair work as extensive alterations are being planned.

### MINISTER TALKS OF ROADS.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works, arrived in the city last evening from Chatham and today will go to Fredericton on business in connection with his department. Speaking of the opening of the roads, Mr. Veniot said that it was hoped to have all the main line roads of the province opened to automobile traffic by May 1. One good day of rain would help matters a great deal, he said. It is the intention of the minister to attend the Good Roads convention in Halifax next month, where he will be one of the speakers. Hon. C. W. Robinson, who will then be acting premier, will also attend the convention, it is expected.

## GOVERNMENT OFFICES MOVED TO KING STREET

The headquarters of the provincial government in St. John will in future be in the Merchants Bank building, Prince William street, the top floor of which building has been rented for this purpose. E. S. Carter, secretary to the premier, is already installed in a bright and sunny office, as is W. H. McQuade, the provincial tax inspector. Yesterday the furniture of the executive council chamber was moved from the old office, Prince William street, to the new one, and in the future all St. John meetings of the executive council will be held in the new quarters. The old premises will be retained for a while, at least.

### Kings County Roads;

Mr. Carter Resigns

E. S. Carter, of Rothesay, who has been acting as inspector of roads for the county of Kings since 1917, has found that the demand upon his time and energies was too exacting and asked the minister of public works, Hon. P. J. Veniot, to relieve him from inspection duties. In his reply the minister of public works paid a very high tribute to the work Mr. Carter had done upon the roads for their betterment and also commented upon the fact that it was done without charge to the government. The road supervisors throughout the county of Kings have been notified of the change caused by the resignation of Mr. Carter.

## MEAT PACKER'S SON SUICIDES

Los Angeles, Cal., April 19.—John P. (Jack) Cudaby, son of the late Michael Cudaby, internationally known meat packer of Kansas City, and found dead today in his bedroom with his head shattered by a shotgun wound, committed suicide after failing to negotiate a \$10,000 loan with a Chicago bank, Detective Sergeant McMahon said tonight. McMahon said Mrs. Cudaby, the widow, told him her husband received a letter yesterday from an officer of the bank informing him the loan could not be carried unless "vouched for" by another member of the Cudaby family. Today, according to McMahon, Cudaby received a telegram from the relative in question declining to vouch for the loan.

## PARADE OF THE UNEMPLOYED

St. John's, Nfld., April 20.—A parade of the city's unemployed today ended at the parliament house where leaders of the demonstration presented resolutions demanding work, removal of all enactments that have survived the war, cessation of state interference with business, withdrawal of restrictions on export of codfish and control of food stuffs. Premier Squires told the crowd that the government had decided to meet the public on all these questions. Opposition leader Cashin pledged the support of his party to measures designed to assist in overcoming the existing depression.

More than 100 members of the Boys' Club of the East End participated in the monthly athletic night at the Y. M. C. A. last evening. After a programme of gymnastics had been gone through and followed by showers and swims, a moving picture entertainment was held. The party was in charge of Harry Scott and Miss Heffer.
