### HARDWARE PRICES

(Hardware and Metal, Sept. 11.)

Most of the changes that have taken place this week are in goods that will be shipped out next spring such as garden tools, sprayers, lawn rollers, hay rakes, and harvest tool handles, scythe stones, etc.

Purported and lined oil is lower in price but "Hardware and Metal" understand that the American flax crop is considerably below previous estimates.

Advances are made in grindstone fixtures, stove pipes, injectors and grease cups and higher prices are quoted on claw-bars and sash weights. Some lines of saddlery hardware are marked higher. Stoves seem likely to advance at any moment.

The increased freight rates announced this week are higher than was generally expected by the trade and the effect will be felt in many hardware lines especially among the heavier class of iron and steel products and in white lead, paint and oils and to a less extent on lighter goods. The opinions of many manufacturers and jobbers on the subject are given in "Hardware and Metal" and when the facts have been digested it will be possible to judge better what effect the new rates will have on prices generally.

Many lines are still very scarce and while the railroad situation is said to

be better, deliveries of raw and finished or partly finished materials from U. S. steel mills are still a very long way behind and production is hampered in many industries.

Wire nails are very scarce as are also Canada plates and galvanized sheets and bar iron and steel.

Business is a little quieter and collections are said to be satisfactory.

TWO EARLS DEAD. London, Sept. 14.—George Francis William Henry Denison, third Earl of Londesborough, died yesterday at Lincoln.

Earl Murray of Elibank, died suddenly yesterday at Walkerton, Scotland, his country home.

FAMILY OF CENTENARIANS. London, Eng., Sept. 14.—Edmond Harris is the third of his family who died over the age of 100. He passed away at 102. His mother and sister also died over 100.

A War Office Story. (London Times Weekly Edition.) Mr. Asquith gave amusing illustration of the way in which in pre-war days the Treasury had always subjected the best approval schemes of the department to the most vigilant scrutiny. The War Office had been removed from Pall Mall to Whitehall, and the proposal came across one day to the Treasury to sanction the expenditure of a very small sum, he thought £500, for the construction of a subway under Whitehall from the War Office to the Treasury, the object being that, in the event of an invasion, archives at the War Office might be safely transferred to a place where they could be more secure. That proposal the Treasury carefully examined.

Sir George Murray was then permanent secretary—and it came before Mr. Asquith with this minute attached: "This proposal ought not to be allowed; the last objective of any intelligent invader of this country would be the War Office."
