RING.

Hear Mr. Johnson.
Mexico City, Jan. 29.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight pugilistic champion, plans to return to the United States at once to face charges pending against him.

Chicago, according to a letter shown the Associated Press yesterday by Johnson. He says he is confident he can arrange legal difficulties in time to fight Havana, Johnson requested Mr. Clynne to give him thirty-six hours of leave after he arrived in Chicago so that he might secure bondsmen and make other legal preparations.

Johnson asserted yesterday that he weighed 213 pounds, but would go into training immediately after reaching the United States.

Johnson was tried in Chicago early in 1919 on charges of having violated the Mann white slave law and was sentenced to a year's imprisonment. He appealed but before the case was argued he forfeited his bail bond of \$15,000 by fleeing to Montreal. Late in June, 1918, he sailed for Europe.

WRESTLING.

Stecher in New York.

New York, Jan. 28.—Joe Stecher, who is to battle Earl Caddock for the world's wrestling crown on Friday night at Madison Square Garden, arrived in New York yesterday.

Stecher was held up by train delay and other setbacks. Accompanying him was his brother, Tony, who acts as his head trainer and manager.

As soon as Stecher had arranged for quarters he went to Bothner's gymnasium to begin his final training operations. He worked all morning with a few of the lesser lights who are preparing for other matches. Stecher showed that he still was close to the form that brought him to a point where he could settle the world's supremacy with Caddock. It was the general opinion that all he required to reach his best form was a little work daily until the date of the match.

There is little doubt that Stecher will again place all his dependence upon his powerful legs. The manner in which he forced Stranger Lewis and Zbyzsko to fall victims to his body scissors hold is proof that his legs still retain their constriction strength. He is confident that he has improved remarkably since he met Caddock two years ago, and is confident he will turn the tables Friday evening.

Caddock kept to the roads yesterday morning, but his return declared he was satisfied with the way he was going along. A delegation of Caddock's friends is due this morning, including Carl Maritz, the Omaha promoter, Joe Coffey and Jack Herman wired they would leave Chicago today. Coffey is coming here to see the match and to try to induce the winner to meet John Freeberg.

SIDELIGHTS ON SPORT

St. John should be represented at the international ice skating championships, which are to take place on Lake Placid, N. Y., on February 18 and 19. Charles Gorman, who won all his speed event in the Police's Sports on Tuesday night should be able to hold his own against the best skaters in America. He is a strong skater and can do equally as well, if not better, on a square or oblong ring than on the circular track in the Victoria. When Bobby McLean, professional champion of the world, skated Gorman here a few years ago he predicted that he would develop into a great racer and his prediction is evidently coming true. In a trial heat a few days prior to the policeman's sports Gorman went the 220 yards under twenty seconds, which is better time than is being hung up at Saranac Lake. He also demonstrated that he is equally good at all distances. It would not cost much to send Gorman away, and it would be a great boost to St. John.

On Black's alleys last night the Thistles got away to a great start and it looked as if they would hang up some new records, but they had bad breaks in the last string and fell down.

The Collegiate hockey teams are playing well this year and the Inter-collegiate league should be keenly contested. An endeavor is being made to get Louis Nelson, lightweight champion wrestler of the world, to come to this city and meet Bridson Green for the title. Green and Nelson met in March, 1919, and the Prince Edward Island boy put the champion's shoulders to the mat for the first time in his career. After wrestling for five hours and fifty-seven minutes the bout was called off and declared a draw.

New York, Jan. 29.—"Music Week will render a great service to the people of New York by directing their attention to music, and by music I do not mean jazz," said Arthur Bodansky, conductor of the New York Symphony Orchestra, in commenting upon Music Week, Feb. 1-7. Mr. Bodansky gave a definition of jazz, or, rather, denied that anything called jazz is music.
"It may be a lot of things—exhilarating, breeziness, voluptuous expression of motion," he said, "but it is not anything canonized by the art standards of man as music."
