**THRIFT RECIPES**

Issued by the Canada Food Board.

**OATMEAL AND TOMATO SOUP.**  
Two cups milk.  
One cup left-over oatmeal porridge.  
One cup strained tomato.  
Celery, onion and bayleaf.  
Salt and pepper to taste.

Method—Scald milk. Add the oatmeal porridge and mix well. Cook the tomato and seasonings and strain. Add to them a pinch of soda and when it ceases to effervesce, combine with the milk and oatmeal. Serve very hot.

**Food Board Flashes**

How is Belgium faring for food? As the most heroic and wronged of small nations it is a matter of concern to all who know the condition of her food supplies, now that deliverance has come to her. Some time ago the Belgian government established a Food Administration and her food problems are being taken in hand as rapidly as possible. With sufficient notice it is possible to buy almost any kind of food in Belgium but when it is remembered that over one-half of the population have an income under \$4 a week per family it can readily be understood how few can afford to pay the price. Meat is \$2 a pound, eggs are \$1 each and butter is \$2.30 a pound. There has been a great spread of tuberculosis throughout the country as a result of undernutrition.

**Women Police Force in London**

Formation of Small Body Sanctioned—Pioneers in the Work Want to Continue

London, Jan. 20.—The Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police says that the Home Secretary has sanctioned the formation of a small body of women patrols under the control of the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis. For some time past the commissioner has employed some of the women patrols of the National Union of Women Workers who have done very useful work, but this arrangement will now be discontinued.

The women will not be sworn in as constables, and will not therefore have those special powers which are given to constables under certain statutes. They will, however, patrol streets and open spaces in the same way as the regular constable, for the purpose of preserving order and assisting the public, more especially those of their own sex. They will wear uniform dress, with the badges of the regular force, and be under the control of a superintendent and other women officers.

Only about 100 women will be enrolled for the present, and preference will, of course, be given to candidates who have had experience of similar work in government or other forces, and are specially recommended by their superior officers. The pay of the rank and file will at present be at the rate of thirty shillings a week, with a war bonus of twelve shillings a week, but provision will be made for a progressive rise of pay in the event of service extending beyond a year. The scheme is an experimental one, and its continuance or development must depend upon experience of its efficacy.

In a statement on the subject of the proposed new official force of women police for London, Miss Damer Dawson, commandant of the women police, said that the women police service would most certainly enter a protest against such a scheme, should it include those officers and members of the service who were pioneers of this movement. It was, she said, from the good work of these women and from the public testimonials which the service had received, that the present women police force in London and throughout the provinces had been deemed necessary and useful. Owing to the reduction in staff in many munition factories, a considerable number of trained and experienced police-women, she pointed out, would be released in a few days and thrown out of work. The munition police-women, she said, were trained for courage, bravery, tact and general efficiency. The members of the women police service, Miss Damer Dawson said, have been trained by public money. There were already a considerable number of their police-women working in the West End thoroughfares who had a thorough knowledge of the life of the streets. The women police service, however, had not been asked by the chief commissioner to send in the names of these women, although it had offered to do so.

**NO WELCOME FOR EX-KAISER THERE**

People of Corfu, Where He Has Villa, Not Anxious to Have Him

Corfu, Dec. 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—If William Hohenzollern, the former German Emperor, should try to spend the remnant of his career on the island of Corfu, as some recent reports indicated, he would not be received by the natives with any great show of hospitality or cordiality. The villa here which he last occupied in the summer of 1914 and which he owned, is now used as a military hospital and hosts the French flag. Even the especially built dock on which he was accustomed to land is now used for military purposes.

The Greek and Serbian population, many of whom are refugees, realize well the misery and suffering that Hohenzollern caused the world and are in no mood to receive him even as temporary visitor.

"Achillion Palace," his villa, stands high on the rocky coast of Corfu amid a wealth of cypress trees and overlooks the picturesque Ionian Sea. The snow-capped mountains of Albania are only a short distance away. The villa has been occupied lately by disabled Allied soldiers.
