IN ALBANIA. Mussulmans Said to Have Captured Kortiia. Durazzo, Albania, July 6.—It was reported today that the Mussulman insurgents in Southern Albania who are fighting against government of Prince William had captured the important city of Kortiia. Washington, July 6.—President Wilson has notified the principal European powers that the United States disclaims any responsibility for the statements regarding Albania attributed to George Fred Williams, American minister to Greece and Montenegro. The president refused to discuss Mr. Williams' resignation today, but it was understood it had not yet been received.

MADIGAN FOR ST. JOHN RIVER COMMISSION. Houlton, July 4.—It is understood that friends of Hon. John D. Madigan are to urge his appointment as a member of the International St. John River commission to succeed the late Hon. George H. Marchie of Calais. Mr. Madigan possesses the highest qualifications for the office. He is one of the leading lawyers of the state, was prominently mentioned during Governor Plaister's administration for a position on the supreme court bench and should President Wilson appoint him to the commission it is felt that it would be one of the best appointments that could be made.

SECOND LOT OF HINDUS ON THE WAY. Ottawa, Ont., July 6.—The immigration officials have received confirmation of the report that a second ship load of Hindus have left India for Canada. The decision of the British Columbia courts and the application of habeas corpus in the case of the 350 Hindus in Vancouver harbor is looked forward to with apprehension.

In Honor of New Cardinal. Quebec, July 6.—Cardinal Binet was the object of a striking demonstration by Irish Catholics last night when he paid his first visit as a prince of the Church to St. Patrick's. An address and purse were presented to His Eminence.

ULTRA-VIOLET RAYS TO STERILIZE LYMPH. Berlin, July 6.—The anti-vaccinationists are about to lose their strongest argument. Their most telling objection against vaccination has long been that it was impossible to get absolutely pure vaccine matter; that notwithstanding the greatest precautions, like the use of cultures kept under specially sanitary conditions, the lymph obtained would infrequently contain deleterious germs. According to the German Medical Weekly, however, a way has at last been found for sterilizing lymph so thoroughly that it can be used with safety. This has been accomplished by Prof. E. Friedberger and Dr. E. Mironescu, who have availed themselves of the well-known principle that the ultra-violet rays of light are destructive of bacterial life. The virus is put into small tubes of quartz-glass, which are then exposed to the ultra violet rays from an electric lamp. In twenty or thirty minutes there is not a live germ left in them.

BISHOP OF LONDON WRITES TO THE TIMES. London, July 6.—The Bishop of London has written to The Times contradicting the idea that he condones sullying the name of the church by objecting to forcible feeding. While a strong anti-antiquity, he will continue his support to the constitutional cause.

LITTLE CHANGE FOR O'LEARY. At three o'clock today Doctor W. W. White, said that O'Leary's internal organs were badly torn and that there was very little chance for his recovery. The bullet was located by X-ray and is still in his body.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES. Turkish officers are in Paris with a view to re-organization of the Turkish army. A four foot alligator escaped into the Welland Canal at St. Catharines, and bathing operations have been suspended. The body of William Burt, drowned at Fort Dalhousie, Ont., by the sinking of a dredge, has been recovered. Eleven other men narrowly escaped death. The big Y. M. C. A. Industrial Exposition at Hamilton was formerly opened by Lieut.-Governor Gibson today. Sir Benjamin Stone died in London four days ago, and Lady Stone died today. President Wilson has endorsed a bill for a larger measure of self-government for the Philippines. He does not expect it to pass at this session of congress. The British government will investigate the arrest of Albert St. Clair Douglas, a British subject, by Villa's troops in Mexico. This is the last week of the provincial political campaign in Manitoba. Both Rogers and Hon. Dr. Roche, of the federal cabinet, are assisting Premier Roblin. Mr. Morrison, the opposition leader, has issued a manifesto urging the greatest vigilance to protect the polls on election day.

MARRIED IN LONDON. The wedding of Mrs. Beatrice Rigby Higgins, daughter of Mr. Rigby and the late John R. Rigby, of this city, to John Angus Mackay, of New York, was celebrated in St. Columba's Presbyterian church, Pont street, Belgravia, London, England, by Rev. Archibald Fleming, D.D., on Wednesday, June 24, at noon. The bride, whose mother, Mrs. J. R. Rigby, resides in Charlotte street, St. John, has made her home in New York for several years and recently has been traveling in Europe. Mr. Mackay is president of the Angus Publishing Company, of New York, London, Paris and Toronto, publishers of "The Spur," fashionable magazine. After the wedding ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Mackay left London for Paris and will spend their honeymoon on the continent. They will return via Canada to meet Mr. Mackay's father who resides in Kingston, Ont., and on their return to New York will make their home in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

A bark canoe with two young men in it capsized near the mouth of the Naushawaska yesterday and the occupants had a narrow escape. They were picked up by Albert Treadwell and Joseph Gorman. R. A.
