Rolled Oats and Corn Meal Mill
Would Employ 75 Hands

(Special To Times)

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 2—One of the most recent propositions brought before the people of P. E. Island is that of the Colonial Corporations Ltd. of Hali fax. Of late years, there has been a marked advance in the quality of island oats and investigation has shown that they are richer in meal than any other oats grown in Canada. The crop last year, was seven millions of bushels, whilst that of Nova Scotla was only two millions and New Brunswick one million. This company has been considering the advisability of locating in this province to be near the source of supply and to put up a plant with a 200 barrel a day capacity for manufacturing rolled oats and corn—meal. They expect to employ seventy-five hands, all local labor with the exception of the head miller and the chief engineer. They ask the city to provide a free site, free water and exemption from taxation for a term of years.

Some weeks ago representatives of the company came over and examined several sites. They found that the best would require expensive foundations not foreseen in their first estimate and at a meeting of the city council and members of the board of trade, they added to their former request, a request for a lump sum to help them in the extra expense in preparing a concrete foundation. The city was disposed to grant free water, a free site and exemption from taxation for five or ten years, but nothing furtheer.
