MORSE IS IN A SERIOUS CONDITION

Suffers From Bright's Disease and it is Said Prison Would So on End His Days—Has Made Improvement in Hospital

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 30.—A reporter saw Charles W. Morse in the post hospital at Fort Mifflin, where he was taken from the federal penitentiary in this city seriously ill. The former New York banker appeared to have lost but eight pounds since the day he left the Tomb, New York, and is the ghost of his former self.

The authorities at Washington have been fully acquainted with these facts, but up to the present they believed that half the truth. They are still skeptical, because the federal and other physicians who have been brought into the case have sent in conflicting reports. The doctors failed to agree until Morse was in a desperate state, but now there is no division of opinion as to the nature of his ailment.

The only question is as to how far the disease has advanced, and the government expert will not commit himself on this subject for several days. He will then make a report through military channels.

Morse's cheeks were full, but his body was emaciated, and he was pale. The prisoner, however, was not of the prison. It was that of a man sick to the point of death.

Wednesday and Thursday of the week he lay unconscious most of the time, while the rest of the week he was slowly improving.

Friday, he had gained considerable weight and this improvement became more marked as the week ended. He had lost less blood and was able to assimilate more food.

Then, too, the fact that he was taken from the prison helped remarkably. "It is wonderful to be almost free again," he told Col. James T. Van Orsdale, the post commander, when he called at the hospital.

"I am sure this will make me well," Mr. Morse was unable to do much more than nod in recognition and painfully extend his hand to the reporter. That he was extremely weak was obvious.

"I thank you for calling. I think I shall be better soon," was all he said.

While Morse is under the supervision of Major David Baker, the post surgeon, Dr. A. Fowler, a specialist in this city, is in constant attendance. He has been retained as the patient's personal physician with the consent of Attorney-General Wickersham, and is making daily microscopic examinations to determine whether the disease is responsive to treatment.

As the patient has been sent to the hospital for observation, the results of which will have a distinct bearing upon the application for pardon, neither physician feels inclined to discuss the case. Dr. Fowler, however, goes so far as to admit that Morse is seriously ill, and that should he again be confined in prison he will die.

CITY WATER MATTERS

At the monthly meeting of the Water and Sewerage Board last evening Mr. C. T. Jones reiterated his complaint that the fender supplied to the city was not of the proper quality.

The tenders of C. H. Peters Sons, Ltd., for cast, straw, bran and pressed hay, and W. A. Quinon, for loose hay, were accepted.

The improvement of the island in the Lake Robertson reservoir was left to the engineer.

The offer of properties at Spruce Lake and Little River were referred to the chairman, recorder and city engineer.

An additional \$100 was voted to complete the payment for the work of enclosing a water course in Brooks ward.

The water assessment for the M. R. A. Ltd. stables, was reduced from \$40.83 to \$30.42, as the increase was due to a leak in the pipe. W. J. Fitzpatrick's assessment was reduced by \$5.

The engineer was authorized to purchase six meters at a cost of \$410.

The engineer reported that the decreased water pressure on Mount Pleasant was due to colder weather, that the blockade in the Mill street sewer had been removed by the C. P. R., and on the local in the Loch Lomond main which necessitates cutting off the supply of water from Loch Lomond. He said that if a fire broke out while the water is shut off the results might be very serious.

THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

Toronto, Nov. 30.—With only five days remaining before nomination day, there are nearly thirty ridings in Ontario where the Liberals have not yet nominated candidates, including all the Toronto seats, except North Toronto. F. G. Inwood, provincial Liberal organizer, says he expects to announce several more before nomination day.

ANGELIC CHURCH MATTERS

Rev. A. F. Fenwick and Rev. B. Abbott, who arrived on the Allan MacGillivray on Sunday, will take up work in the Anglican church in this province. Both have but recently been ordained. Rev. A. F. Fenwick will for a time act as curate to Rev. R. P. McKim in St. Luke's church, North End. Rev. B. Abbott will engage in work in Fredericton.

Rev. T. W. Street, recently sub-dean of the Cathedral, Fredericton, who has been residing in this city, will act as temporary rector of the Anglican church at Woodstock, of which Rev. H. G. Alder recently resigned the rectorship.

Today, St. Andrew's day, will be observed by the Anglican churches as a day of prayer for missions. All the churches will be opened during the day for intercessions.
