### BASEBALL

**Yesterday's Games.**  
In the American League, Cleveland made it two straight from Detroit. The latter outbatted Cleveland in an afternoon game but failed to stand off until Cleveland had secured a commanding lead. Boston and Philadelphia divided honors in their double-header. New York took two games from Washington, both games being marked by heavy hitting. The afternoon game "Babe" Ruth socked out his twelfth home run of the season.

## DETROIT PILOT LOSING PUNCH

DETROIT, May 28.—Although it is not to be expected that Frank Navin, chief owner of the Detroit Baseball Club, will announce his private business plans in advance of their consummation, there is a well-defined rumor in circulation here, and one which will not down, to the effect that some drastic changes in the executive department of the Tigers' organization are impending, and impending very closely at that.

The fans admit it and the fact cannot be disguised that Tigers are playing the poorest baseball in major league society. They have been doing it constantly since the season opened six weeks ago, and although they played many games at home, and have not every team in the league, they have not won a single series. They proved helpless a month after the season opened, when they should have hit their true stride, even against so-called weak teams of the east. One game out of the best they have been able to accomplish.

**Shake-up Promised.**

That is what makes the rumor highly probable that a big shake-up on the team will be made very soon. As to what is going to happen, there are many rumors. Attention is also being called to the fact that Jack Combs is making a haze of directing the pitching staff and has lost the confidence and respect of the players. The pitchers are certainly out of whack somewhere, whether it is the fault of Combs or not. Certainly the men are not going as well this year as they did last, when they had no Combs. Combs Not Popular.

Jack is not popular with the players. Possibly it is because he preaches too much. It is certain his pull with the players began to wane even before the training season was over. In view of this situation, it is possible that something might happen to Combs.
