The Governor's Speech

The main features contained in the Governor's Speech in both branches of the Legislature, delivered on Wednesday, were as follows:—Reference to the war and the part Newfoundland is playing in connection with it, a measure to provide financial assistance towards the maintenance of those who suffer partial or total disablement while on active service, or to the dependents of those who lose their lives while so engaged; the trade and commerce of our country and the high prices obtained for our exports; the unfavorable outlook of the fishery, and the good outlook before our people for a profitable prosecution of the cod and other fisheries the coming summer.

The references to the Revenue shows a deficit for the past fiscal year, and for the current fiscal year an even greater shortage is apprehended. The \$500,000 cash reserve will be used to make up the shortage. The estimates for the coming year have been prepared to meet only indispensable requirements.

Reference is also made to the visit of the Duke of Cornwall; the visit of the Royal Commission; the Report of Mr. Duff, the fishery expert; of Prof. Dunstan, the head of the Imperial Institute in London; of the Joint Committee of both branches of the Legislature appointed at the spring session last year to investigate fishery problems of pressing importance; of the Commission appointed to enquire into the circumstances attending the death of members of the crew of the S. S. Southern Cross and her whole crew, etc.

Reference is also made to negotiations now taking place between the Government and a corporation which proposes to establish in this Island and on Labrador an industry of exceptional magnitude.

WAR NEWS

April 7.—Society. Harcourt wires that Petrograd officially reports successful progress around Uzsook Pass, Carpathians, when 25 German officers, 2,000 men and 3 guns were captured. Also that Russian Black Sea fleet pursued Turko German cruisers Goeben and Breslau last Saturday. Also Paris officially reports capture of three lines of trenches near St. Mihiel, and that British airship raid did much damage to German submarines and submarine plants in Belgium.

Cape Town officially reports that Botha's troops occupied Warmbad, a town in German Southwest Africa 30 miles north of Orange River, without opposition.

Berlin officially notifies Washington that Germany holds Britain responsible for loss of life aboard submarine British steamer Falaba because Germany warned neutral passengers against crossing war zone, and assigns military necessity as reason for action of submarines, which prevents them from saving lives.

London reports message from Athens states that British warships bombarded forts at the entrance to Gulf of Smyrna on Monday.

Kitchener has appointed committee to take necessary steps to provide such additional labor as required to ensure the providing of ample supplies of war munitions for all requirements.

Sealing News

A message from the Eagle received on Tuesday night was a little encouraging. Capt. Bishop reported for 5,500 seals for the day, 1,500 of which were on board and 4,000 landed. The seals are supposed to be plentiful. Florida reports ship practically jammed all day and could not get seals killed. Ice conditions are the worst ever seen. The Adventure and Bellaventure were still jammed, but prospects for seals were good if they got clear. No encouraging reports have been received from the Gulf, and the Bonaventure has not been heard from lately.

It is thought the Bonaventure's chances for a good trip are good. Some of the Atlantic steamers got free from the ice this week.

Matron Powell and the Plaindealer

In an editorial in last week's issue of the Plaindealer a story is published regarding the action of Miss Powell, Matron at the General Hospital, St. John's, in ordering Miss Gearin to remove from her breast a piece of green ribbon which she was wearing on St. Patrick's Day. The article contains a number of statements regarding "ignorant bigotry," etc., which seems to us to be uncalled for. Such statements have not been uncommon in a certain section of the St. John's press for the past two or three years.

We hold no brief for Miss Powell. In fact we don't know the lady. Neither do we know anything definite about the matter to which the Plaindealer refers. On the face of it we can only surmise that Miss Powell must have had some reason for ordering Miss Gearin to remove the offending bit of ribbon.

Is there not a rule in connection with the General Hospital—a public institution—which forbids the wearing of green, orange, blue or any other color by nurses or other employees while on duty?

We do not know if this is the case, but we surmise that there must be some rule or regulation in reference to the wearing of colors or Miss Powell would not have acted as she did.

There is, we understand, a regulation re the wearing of ribbon, badges, etc., in connection with our soldiers and sailors, and it was enforced in St. John's recently.

Further comment is reserved until we learn more about the matter.

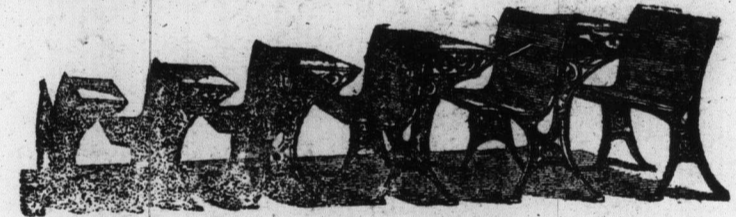
