This feeling

has not been lessened by the fact that more than a crushing back of the latter and the further advance of the Matabeles. The enemy has been kept plentifully and regularly supplied with cattle, and it is believed, with ammunition for all the rifles in the possession of the natives. Those supplies were sent out from the Matoppo hills, the Mata-beles' headquarters. CANADIAN CREE INDIANS.

Active Steps to be Taken for Their Removal From Montana.

Washington, April 29.-The senate committee of foreign relations to-day took favorable action upon Senator Carter's proposed amendment to the general deficiency bill providing an appropriation for the removal of the Cree Indians from Montana. The amendment provides that the Indians be collected, taken to the Canadian border and there delivered to the Conadian authorities.
