The import has been small during the month, remarkably so of Quebec the month, remarkably so of Quebec Woods, and the aggregate inport of the year up to this time from Quebec has been 58 per cent. less than last <u>year</u>; the con-sumption has been on a very reduced scale, and this also applies more especi-ally to Quebec Woods. The stock is less than last year, but quite sufficient for the present and prospective limited demand.
