

The weakening effect was already manifest in the American department of the London market before the open-ing hour. The New York stock market opened in a semi-demoralized condition and very large blocks of stock were unloaded in all directions at acute de-clines. Naturally the stock of the trans-continental railroads, as being immediately interested, were most af-fected but large losses were shown in other stocks where speculation for the rise had been extended, the coalers, the high-priced industrials and the local tractions all showing sharp losses. Great Northern Dfd. dropped 51-2. Tennessee Coal, Southern Pacific, St. Paul, Miss. Pacific, Sugar, Meropoli-tan Street Railway, Reading and At-chison from two to over three points. Many stocks in the miscellaneous list including U. S. Steel stocks showed losses of a point or more. "Large losses were made in addition-al stocks, St. Paul pfd., Wheeling and take Erie first pfd. Northwestern Ills., Central, Wabash pfd., Consolid-ated Gas and General Electric dropping from 2 to 31-2. The leading stocks all made their prices at the start and sup-porting orders carried them up between one and two points. Tenn. Coal made the extreme raily of 21-4, but the Paci-fics, Readings, Sugar and the Trac-tions were all prominent in the upturn, st. Paul, however, only made a small recovery and western stocks generally lagged. Quick profits were taken by the graders later and was a general set back on lessened dealings.
