


OPSE SHOW JUDGES SCORED correspondent Charges Rank Unfairness as Well as Incompetence-About the Blair Cup.

A sound, gentle, breedy, good attad road horse stood no show what-ever in this class, with a horse that showed more action—that is pawing the air and covering very little ground, while the good gaited chap was get-ting somewhere all the while. It is an assured fact that the judges did not do their duty, and after 10.30 o'clock last night, when all but one class had been shown, there was a dif-ference of opinion as to which of two horses should get a prise, and one of the committee told the judges "to go ahead and do their duty fearlessly." Another matter worthy of comment, is the fact that in the heavy harness class for roadsters, on Tuesday inght, Mrs. Coster's "Chum" beat George Mo-Avity's horse, while last night, under the same conditions, Mr. MoAvity's horse beat "Chum" for the Blair cup. There was a great deal of disatisfac-tion expressed about this and the spec-tators were at a loss to know how it could be—if the judges were warranted in giving Mrs. Coster first over the Mo-Avity's horse on Tuesday, why wouldn't heir decision hold good the following svoning? There was lots of talk about a "pull" and, as one horseman remark-ed, "there will be a great deal of cold the duchk this winter and, the matter will be discussed on more than one oc-casion."

casion." If St. John intends to hold a horse show annually, it would be well to sug-sest that good, competent judges be secured, who will do their duty.
