FAVORABLE IMPRESSION

BERLIN, Feb. 12. — King Edward took a long automobile ride this morning through the Grunewald with Prince Henry of Prussia, after which he had luncheon with the Emperor. The King and Queen Alexandra will leave here for London at 5 o'clock this afternoon

afternoon.

The streets of Berlin are still gally decorated with flags and the crowds continue to show much interest in the British ruler. Whenever he rides out the streets are lined with people anxious to see him. The impression made by the King on the German people has been very favorable, and his visit to the town hall of this city two days ago is regarded as a high compliment to the German burgher classes as well as a tribute to the merchants and financiers of the country, who are in reality the makers of modern Germany. While the newspapers continue to assert that there is little expectation of tangible and positive results from the royal visit they express the belief that the coming of the king will promote a good understanding between the two countries.
