National Review of London Says Difficulty is Not a Case Where Great Britain Should

London, Nov. 28.—The National Review, which is usually hostile to America, says of the Mexican question that the propinquity of Mexico to the United States is the most important of the outstanding elementary facts to be taken into consideration, and pronounces "as utterly farcical the irresponsible idea that Mexico is a suitable field for spirited British policy."

The Review adds:

"It is quite useless to attack or abuse the United States for pursuing a policy which would undoubtedly be ours were we in her postiton. She is confronted by a grave problem at a highly inconvenient moment. The president is the soul of sincerity and detests the idea of going to war, It is a palpable case for masterly inactivity on our part. We recognize that Mexico is exclusively an American problem, as America acknowledged Transvaal to be a British problem."
