OUTSIDERS WANT TUBERS FOR NOTHING

Misrepresentation of Condition in Carleton County Spread Broadcast Over Canada, is Hurting Farmers Chances to Sell Profitably. Hartland, N. B., Jan. 5.—Mr. David Jackson, superintendent of bridges in this section of the province, was in Hartland on Sunday. He reports that much of the lumber for the repairs to the bridge here has been ordered and work will be commenced during the latter part of this month or the first of next. New cross and lateral pieces will be put in where needed, and a new hardwood floor will be laid over the old one, with small iron strips to prevent horses from slipping. The structure will be made thoroughly safe, to last until the steel superstructure can be erected in the course of a couple of years or so.

While speaking of bridge matters Mr. Jackson said he is now building a fine new one-way wooden covered bridge over the Chiquibank West of Blauville, which, when finished, will be a great convenience to the people in that section of the county. Some necessary repairs are being made to what is known as the Red Bridge, over the Medouic, a short distance above Woodstock.

Another case of similar nature is pending, a seizure of liquor having been made. An inspector who visited the Parishes of Alma, Harvey and Hope well this week, reports that the people are showing much satisfaction at the strict enforcement of the law.
