He was particularly interested in the Ma sonic Fraternity, and had held office in that order, including his being pas master in Albion Lodge, past high priest, Carleton Chapter, No. 1, Roya Arch Chapter, past commander of the Encampment of St. John, Knight Templars, and past potentate of Luxo Temple, Order of the Mystic Shrine Besides being a prominent Mason Dr. McIntosh took a keen interest; his membership in St. Andrew's Society, and was also a member of the board of trustees of St. Andrew church.
