Ottawa, June 11—(By Canadian Press)—A total of 19,047 residences, eight thousand and fifty-nine of which are occupied by their owners, is credited to Ottawa in a summary of home building for ten of the principal cities of Canada. The relationship of home or house ownership is given as being forty per cent, while London, Ont., tops the list with 80 per cent. and Montreal, the largest city of the Dominion is last with only five per cent.

The report states that there is no other country which shows so high a proportion of home ownership in the larger cities than does Canada, according to the figures compiled by MacLean Building Reports Ltd. 
