The entries in their diary are not very full, but some are very suggestive of the hardships that they were undergoing. The trail was excellent, the dogs were fat and the sleds were heavily loaded. They were breaking through ice, getting wet, and the cold was another dog and all hands made a good meal of dog meat.

On January 26 "The going was very heavy in deep snow and the hands and dogs getting weak." January 30—"All hands feeling sick supposed to be from eating dogs' liver."

On March 21 about three miles below the portage on the Peel river he found the bodies of some of the party. They only had a few days' march to go. There were absolutely no provisions or any sign of the dogs. Inspector Fitzgerald had concluded that these men were too weak to travel through and left them all with camp equipment the night before. With Carter he pushed on toward Fort MacPherson, with the hope of getting relief to send back. About ten miles further on he and Inspector Fitzgerald yielded up their lives. Carter succumbed first and was laid out by Inspector Fitzgerald, who probably died shortly after.
