At length, as all their efforts to restore Gladys to consciousness proved unavailing, Mrs. Llewellyn looked up from her task and said:

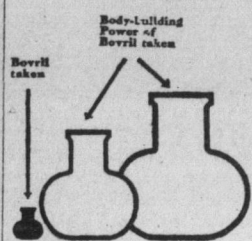
