HONDURAS.—The new stamps are said to be made by a stamp dealer in Germany and will dot be out for some time.

MAURITIUS.—The 4c. is vermilion, as well as the 3c. and 10c.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—There has been prizes paid for design for the new jubilee set of stamps. Values are as follows:—1d, 2d, 4d, 6d, 8d, 1s., 5s., 20s. They are to be inscribed 'New South Wales' and 'one hundred years'. The value to be written in words.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.—The color of the new set is the only change, the design is unchanged; 1c. green; 5c. blue; 6c. yellow brown. The 2 1/8c. blue, of 1882 has been surcharged in oval "Union—Gral—8—cent—Habilitudo."

RUSSIA.—The 2 kop is now light green instead of dark green.

SANTANDER.—The new 10c. violet is inscribed "Departamento de Santander," and of the new type there is a 5c. vermilion.

SENGAL.—We hear of 5c on, 30c. and 10c on. 4c.

TOLIMA.—There are three new stamps inscribed "Departamento del Tolima" 5c. vermilion; 10c. green; 50c. blue.

UNITED STATES.—The color of the 30c. has been changed to brown; and the 5c. Garfield to dark blue.

URUGUAY.—The 5c. is again blue; 7c. orange; 20c. brown; 25 cent vermilion.
