

position he held until his retirement in Oct., 1883. Received Hon. degree of LL.D., Univ. of Queen's Coll., Kingston, 1884, and apptd. Q.C. by Dominion Govt., 14 Dec., 1889. Admitted a mem. of the Hon. Soc. of King's Inns., and on 5 Nov., 1890. was called to the Irish Bar by the Lord Chancellor of Ireland. Much of the reform and regulation of the legal procedure of the several courts in Ontario is due to him. Assisted in the consolidation of the Statutes of Can. in 1858 and 1859; in 1869 in the consolidation of the Criminal Law, and in 1876 in the consolidation of the Statute Law of Ontario. Was the Judicial mem. of the Board of Arbitrators apptd. to settle the difference between the Govt. and the contractors for the Public Buildings at Ottawa; Chairman of the Board of Judges for Ont., 1869 to 1887; a mem. of the Commission to inquire into the constitution and jurisdiction of the several Courts of Law and Equity in Ont., 1871, and on the 14 Aug., 1873, apptd. a mem. of the Royal Commission to investigate the charges against the Ministry in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway contract. Apptd. to the High Court of Justice, 1882; Chairman of the Barrie Collegiate Institute by annual election, 1881 to 1890. Called to the Senate 29 Jan., 1885. During the Session of 1888 framed and introduced Rules reforming the procedure in the Senate with respect to applications for Divorce, which Rules were ultimately adopted by the House. GRANT, Hon. ROBERT PATTERSON, J. P.

S. of the late Lewis Grant; Bookseller and Publisher, Inverness Scot. B. there 12 April, 1814. Ed. at the Inverness Royal Academy. Came to Can., 1833. Went to N.S., 1835. M., 1840, Annie, dau. of the late James Carmichael, of New Glasgow. Was President of the Pictou Bank. Contested four elections in the Liberal interest, in only one of which was successful; on that occasion he was elected to the N.S. Assem., from the N. R. of Pictou, which seat he held from 1859 to 1863. Has always been a Liberal, but differed from his political friends on one question—the question of Confederation, which he favoured. Called to the Senate 2 Feb., 1877.—*Sea Bank, Pictou, N.S.*
