the misfortune to be treated as common enemies, merely because they are poor, and differ in the colour of ther skin. I however feel it an imperative duty to preserve the memory of this interesting people, who must soon feel the sad effects of that exterminating decree which avarice has sent forth against them.

As far as relates to those Indians who infest the streets and wharves of Halifax, I am of opinion, that many of them can never be effectually reclaimed, without the interposition of that Almighty Power who "is not willing that any should perish." I have nevertheless a thorough conviction, that even those miserable outcasts may be in some measure rendered useful to the community, as several of the most deprayed of the men, have not only been actively employed in clearing and cultivating land at the Settlement at Shubenacadie for several months, but have during that time abstained altogether from the use of spirituous liquors; and surely when we have the most indubitable and respectable authority, that we have introduced the demoralizing habit of drinking among them, they are at least entitled to our commiseration.

ROBERTSON says "the people of North America when first discovered, were not acquainted with any intoxicating drink, but as the Europeans early found it their interest to supply them with spirituous liquors, drunkenness soon became as universal among them, as among their countrymen to the South."
