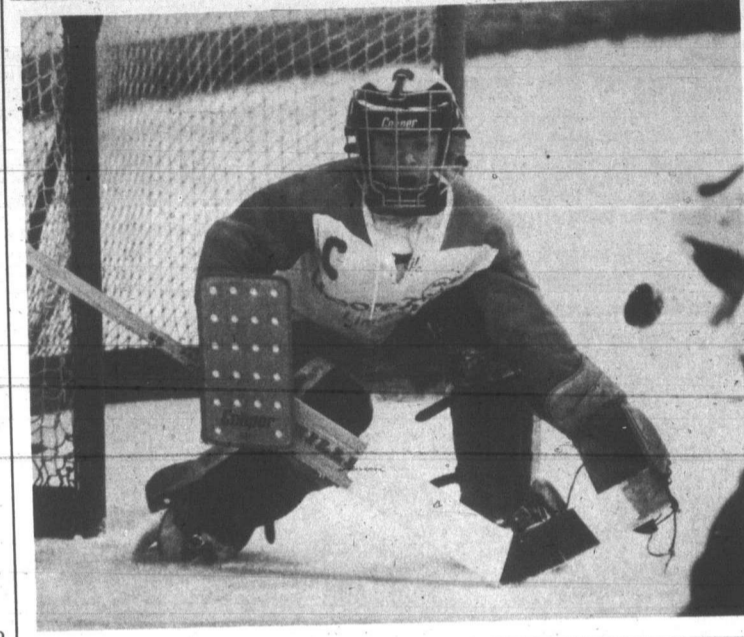


Lilly power sparks Lorne Park

Sharp Oakville Blades end Derbys' gallop

STREETSVILLE—Oakville Blades drove the last nail into the Streetsville Derby coffin last Sunday afternoon, as they seem to do every year, handing the Derbys a 6-4 setback. The result eliminated Streetsville from any further participation in the Central Ontario Junior B playoffs in three straight games.

In the first two starts, Blades triumphed 8-6 and 9-3.

Derbys gave it the "old college-try"—but couldn't unnerve the diligent Oakville club in the "do-or-die" third meeting.

When the final buzzer went, the standing room-only crowd of disappointed Streetsville rooters proudly gave their heroes the standing ovation they so richly deserved.

This generous tribute was only fitting, in recognition of the brand of hockey the Derbys have treated their fans to all season.

The players can be proud. They remained poised and determined throughout the entire season. Their playoff

performance was admirable in view of the fact that only a few players had Junior B playoff experience before.

The last Derby game of 1972-73 will be remembered as one of the chiest and most penalty-filled games of the year. The stage was set when Streetsville defenseman Tom Smith received two minors, a ten minute misconduct, and a game misconduct early in the first period.

Between fights, a few goals were scored, the first by Streetsville's John Sands, who hit at the 9:54 mark on a breakaway. Seven minutes later, Oakville gained a brief tie until Bruce Sparkes put Derbys back in front with less than two minutes to go.

Streetsville's 2-1 first period lead was overshadowed by the 90 minutes in penalties that were handed out. The period took 52 minutes to complete.

In the second frame, Streetsville came out charging and grabbed a commanding 4-1 lead on goals by Frank Laciak and Johnny Campbell. At that point, it looked as if the

Derbys would be making another trip back to Oakville.

However, Oakville's Bill Sherlock had other ideas. For the second time in the series, Sherlock scored three goals to save his club from defeat. This time Sherlock scored all three of his goals within 108 seconds to give his team a fast 4-4 tie. The second period ended with the Derbys obviously shaken by the comeback.

In the third period, the Blades withstood everything the Derbys could throw at them. Oakville's Ross Rich got the clincher at the 8:18 mark. From then on, their continual fore-checking stifled the Derbys completely.

Derbys outshot Oakville 34-31 in the game but had difficulty beating Blades netminder Keith Mills.

Streetsville manager Ken Will was very proud of his team's effort and paid tribute to the Oakville club. "Oakville deserved to win. They handled themselves very well and showed a lot of guts," he said.

The Derbys fell just short of their first encounter at Streetsville Arena. Their unusually porous defense cost them as they lost 8-6. Derby marksmen in that game were Aidian Flatley, Dave Watts, Archie Case, Guy Mortson, Frank Laciak, and Matt Haggis.

At Oakville, Streetsville bombed 9-3 Friday to add humiliation to defeat. Guy Mortson, John Sands and Frank Laciak were the Streetsville snipers.

Next year's Derby club will lose the services of Al Watts, Tom Smith and Archie Chase (all defencemen) because of the age limit. If everybody else returns, Derbys will be a team to be reckoned with.

However, Manager Ken Will fears that next year might be a rebuilding year.

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Julie Bonner wins Peel-Halton swim laurels

The most amazing about Julie Bonner's golden feat in the Peel-Halton high school swimming championships wasn't so much that the T.L. Kennedy competitor won two events.

This was predictable enough.

But the aquatic strength this 14-year-old Kougargirl exhibited while crowning herself queen in 200-metre freestyle and 100-m butterfly events caused the odd eyebrow or three to do an impromptu pool-side jig at the Angela Coughlan complex in Burlington, where the best from the host Halton region dated arch-rival from Peel to decide who's how.

Peel won seven of 18 events with Kennedy taking four and county champion Erindale accounting for the other three.

Julie Bonner, who switched allegiance from the Town of Mississauga Aquatic Club to Etobicoke last year in the immediate interest of self-improvement, was clocked at 2:23.3 minutes while splashing her way to the 200-m freestyle title. Her time almost four seconds ahead of runner-up Francis Buxton (TA Blakelock, Burlington) and would have been good enough to finish fifth in the boys' field.

The Kougargirl struck another blow for women's lib aquatic style with second win of the meet in the 100-m butterfly (1:13.4), then added a bronze to a successful collection in the 100-m freestyle.

Ingrid Solmsen (girls 50-m free, 32.5) and John Gora (boys 100-m fly, 1:07.0) took care of the rest of the Kennedy collection.

The Peel-Halton duel meet provided ground for the big "whip kick controversy".

It happened when Erindale's Pan-Am and Olympic team hopeful Graham Sutch and Burlington Nelson's Joe Potocsko were disqualified in the 100-m individual medley for using the powerful whip kick — a modernized and effective version of the "frog kick".

As it turned out, this is a definite "no-no" in high school aquatic circles, where competition is governed by the rules of the U.S. National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), which allows the "dolphin kick" but frowns on the whip. Canadian governing allows the whip kick.

Sutch, who went into the meet with hopes of winning at least a pair of first places, had to be satisfied with only the 100-m breast (1:16.2).

"Graham can do the dolphin kick and we'll adjust for the Ontario finals," commented Erindale coach Garry Closson, adding that the experience of the Burlington meet helped his swimmers. "We learned a lot about the competition we are facing."

Stuart MacInnes took the boys 50-m free (28.8) then helped Erindale to victory in the 200-m freestyle relay. Larry Dallimore, Derek Chantler and Scott Anderson completed the Raider quartet.

Carolyn Gora (TL Kennedy, 100-m breast), Dan Rogers (Clarkson, 100-m back) and Sutch (100-m free) finished runners-up; while third places went to Ian

Macdonald (Kennedy, 100- and 200-m free) and Rogers (100-m fly).

Erindale came second in the boys team standings; Kennedy was fourth in both boys and girls divisions and third overall, behind Burlington schools Blakelock and Nelson and ahead of Erindale.

Next on the agenda is the all-Ontario finals.



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
