- 9 ADELAIDE.—M. Martiniquetta 170, 199, to Adelaide, 1876; announced, 1 July, 1893
- 23 AFRICA.—M. Gobé arrives at Bordeaux after three years' successful exploration in Central Africa to take Chailly, 21 July, 1893  
West Africa.—French janite; expedition from Bamunko captures Sikasso, the capital of Kenesaga, King Baboula and many of his men killed; May; Bent; Wedel totally defeats the Soles of Cavalry, 9 Sept.  
British West Africa.—Niger coast protec-torate; expedition, under majors Seurle, Courdour and others leaves Opozo, 2 April, to hold a palaver with the Nuwo chief (who had been stopping trade, etc.), at Onomukoso; his refusal to meet the British, his town was stormed and taken with some loss; the chieftain and his wife surrendered and agreed to terms; reported, 31 May.
- Two expeditions by the Royal Niger company's forces against the emir of Lajid and Argoyes for slave raiding very successful; Lajid captured and destroyed, 23 June; Argoyes occupied, enemy's force heavy, no British killed.
- An expeditionary force from Lagos, under major Arnold, attacks and destroys Siamia in Forwards to punish native piracy, etc., 23 Aug.
- Guinea East Africa.—Sufiela of the sultan of Qwana to avoid capture; end of the Wahab "shir; reported, 7 Sept.

- 35 ALPS.—Dr. John H. Dickenson, electrician, with his son and two daughters, perished by a fall while ascending the Petite Dent de Vésivé, 27 Aug.; Mrs. Norman Neruda, experienced climber, killed by a fall on the Schmidkamm, Dolomites, 2 Sept.; Mr. Aston-Bunn and a guide killed on the Aiguille du Charmoz, 16 Sept., 1898
- 40 AMBASSADORS.—Mr. Thomas F. Bayard, the first Ambassador from the United States to London, appointed 1893, aged 56, 29 Sept., 1893. His predecessors were Ministers.
- 59 ARIZONA.—The town of Jerome declared by fire, 3 deaths, 11 Sept., 1893
- 88 AUSTRIA.—Assassination of the empress Elizabeth (Sisi) 27 Dec., 1897 at Geneva by Luigi Luchino (aged 25), an Italian anarchist, about 2 p.m., 12 Sept.; deeply lamented; public demonstration of Swiss sympathy, 12 Sept.; 13 Sept. in state funeral, the emperor of Germany and other royal personages present, 17 Sept.; two anarchists arrested at Lansanne, 15 Sept., 1898
- 96 BALLOONS.—Mr. Stanley Spencer and Dr. Berson ascended from the Crystal Palace and reached a height of 27,500ft., 27 Sept., 1893
- 103 BANKRUPT.—Mr. E. T. Hooley, manufacturer and promoter of companies, became bankrupt, his statements at his public examinations commencing 27 July, respecting
