23. ADELPHAIDE.—*See* Martinique, 1793, *cont.*
to Adelaide, 1793, *cont.*, announced, 1 July, 1793
After three years' successful exploration in
West Africa, the lake Chad, &c., 21 July, 1798
West Africa.—French military expedition
from Bamako captures Sikasso, the
capital of Kenedji, king Babouba and
many of his men killed, May; Wied, Bonf
defeats the Sokas at Cavilly, 8 Sept.
British West Africa.—Liger coast protector-
ate expedition, 1798, 18 Sept. Scour,
Cockburn and others leave Opué, 1 April,
to hold a palaver with the Nago chief (who
had been stopping trade, etc.), at Omoko-
roko, on his refusal to meet the British,
his town was burned and taken with some
loss; the chief afterwards surrendered and
agreed to terms; reported, 21 May, 1798
Two expeditions by the Royal Niger com-
pany's forces against the omils of Lapi
and Argeyes to slave-trading very success-
ful; Lapi expelled, 24 June.
June; Argeyes expelled, and destroyed, 24
June; Argeyes expelled, enemies' losses
heavy, no British killed, 24 June.
An expeditionary force from Lagos, under
major Amud, attacks and destroys Sanna
in Forcados to punish native piracy, etc.,
25 Aug.
Gambia East Africa.—Sleith of the Sultan
of Quawa to avoid capture; end of the
Wahid rising; reported, 7 Sept., 1798

37. ALISTE.—Dr. John Hapkinson, electrician,
by a fall while ascending the Petrusberg,
the Vesuvius, 27 Aug.; Mr. Norman Neruda,
Schmidknecht, killed by a fall on the
Aston-Blinds and a guide killed on the
Aiguille de Charmes, 16 Sept., 1893.

38. AMBASADORS.—Mr. Thomas F. Javard,
the first Ambassador from the United States
to London, appointed 1893. April 50.
28 Sept., 1893. His predecessors were
Ministers.

39. ARIZONA.—The town of Jerome destroyed
by fire, it ceases to exist, 16 Sept., 1893.

40. AUSTRIA.—Assassination of the empress
Elizabeth (deceased Decr. 1837) at Geneva
by Luigi Lucchei (born 1853), an Italian
anarchist, about 2 p.m., 10 Sept., 1893;
lamented, public demonstration of Swiss
sympathy, 12 Sept.; lying in state
in the Imperial Chapel Vienna, 16 Sept.;
funeral, the emperor of Germany and other
royal personages present, 17 Sept.; two
anarchists arrested at Lansmaing, 18 Sept., 1893.

41. BALBOA.—Mr. Stanley Spencer and Dr.
Reed ascended the height of Crystal Palace
and reached its height of 275,000 ft., 18 Sept., 1893.

42. BANKRUPT.—Mr. Charles W. Johnson, manu-
facturer, and promoter of companies, became
bankrupt, his statements at his public ex-
aminations commencing 27 July, respecting
