London, Out., May 5,-Wm. Boyd and Hugh Stevenson, found guilty of conspiracy to defraud Hugh M. Douglass, were sentenced on the opening of the Assize Court yesterday. The two men were ordered by Mr. Justice Meredith to be imprisoned in the Central Prison at Toronto for a period of one year. His Lord-ship made the statement that the sentences were made considerably lighter by reason of the fact that he had been handed a number of petitions, strongly signed, asking for

Addressing Boyd, His Lordship said that there were 'several things to be regretted in his case. He was a young and intelligent Canadian, born of decent people, as able as any man to earn his own livelihood.

"It is to be regretted that you allowed yourself to become the stool pigeon of American crooks," went on the judge, "to decoy Canadian geese across the border to be plucked. If it had been dope for your own benefit there would have been less disgrace in it for you."

Another thing to be regretted was that the "millionaires," his accomplices, were not in the dock with him. It was to be regretted that any man should stoop to methods shown to have been pursued in this case and that any man should let his cupidity and his stupidity lead him into what constituted him a criminal in the eyes of the law.

"Douglass has received his punishment," went on Justice Meredith Douglass has received his punish-

"Douglass has received his punishment," went on Justice Meredith, "And his punishment is not a light one. He has been fined \$10,000, and has paid dearly for his cupidity." "You are a young man," he continued, in passing sentence. "You have made a fake start, a start that if persisted in will lead to one place only, to the penitentiary for the greater tortion of your life. I have great hores that by this stumbling and tripping up you will become a credit to yourself, your family, and the community. This may become a blessing in disguise to you. We are told it is an ill wind that blows nobody good. I hope this will blow you some good."
