

## KING TO VISIT CANADA IN FALL OF NEXT YEAR

London Correspondent of Brooklyn Eagle Says Plans Are Laid for His Majesty, Accompanied by His Heir, to Open Toronto Exhibition and See America's Cup Races.

NEW YORK, Apr. 28.—The Brooklyn Eagle's London correspondent under date of April 12 writes as follows:

It is now able to announce definitely that King George will visit Canada in the fall of 1914. Only some unexpected change of a family bereavement might prevent this trip taking place.

The King and his advisers are taking somewhat unnecessary pains to keep the proposed visit secret. They are afraid that the Canadians will be disappointed that they read the news of the visit in the newspapers.

A meeting between King George and President Wilson is expected to take place in the near future.

King George has intimated his willingness to open the Toronto Exhibition in August, 1914, and preparations for this event are already being made in English court circles.

**Queen Also May Come.** It will be the first time that any member of the British royal family has visited Canada.

It is hoped that the Queen will accompany the King, but nothing is definitely settled as regards this. The Prince of Wales is quite likely to go with his father on the trip.

The Canadian circles here a visit of the King has long been anticipated. When Lord Grey was Governor-General, power of representation was made as to the desire of the Canadian people to see in person the King.

The appointment of the Duke of Connaught as Governor-General was in no small degree due to the Royal appreciation of this sentiment.

It is understood that the Duke of Connaught has cordially endorsed the earnest solicitation of the Canadian Government and people, to which the King has now acceded, so far as his plans can be arranged in advance.

Lord Strathcona, the veteran High Commissioner of Canada, said yesterday:

"No people of the Empire are more loyal or more attached to the King than the Canadians. His Majesty received evidence of this in 1899—when the Boer War broke out. Should the King go now or at any subsequent time it would be impossible for him to receive a finer welcome in any part of the world than in Canada."

**To Witness Yacht Race.** As the yacht races for the America's Cup take place in September, 1914, there is just a chance that the King on his return trip home, may

be a spectator of Sir Thomas Lipton's fourth attempt to "hit the cup." It has been suggested that the warship on which the King will make the trip to Canada should be diverted to Sandy Hook, so that King George can see in person what happens to the four-leaved "Shamrock."

It is hardly likely that the King would go ashore at New York, but if it can be suitably arranged he would be glad to see one or two of the races for the America's Cup.

During the King's absence from England the Royal prerogatives will be vested in a commission similar to that which was appointed when he went to India to receive the homage of his subjects in that empire.

For reasons of State it may be decided that the Prince of Wales stay in England while his father is abroad.

This trip to Canada is only the forerunner of others. It is King George's ambition to be the first King to visit not only Canada, but also Australia and South Africa.

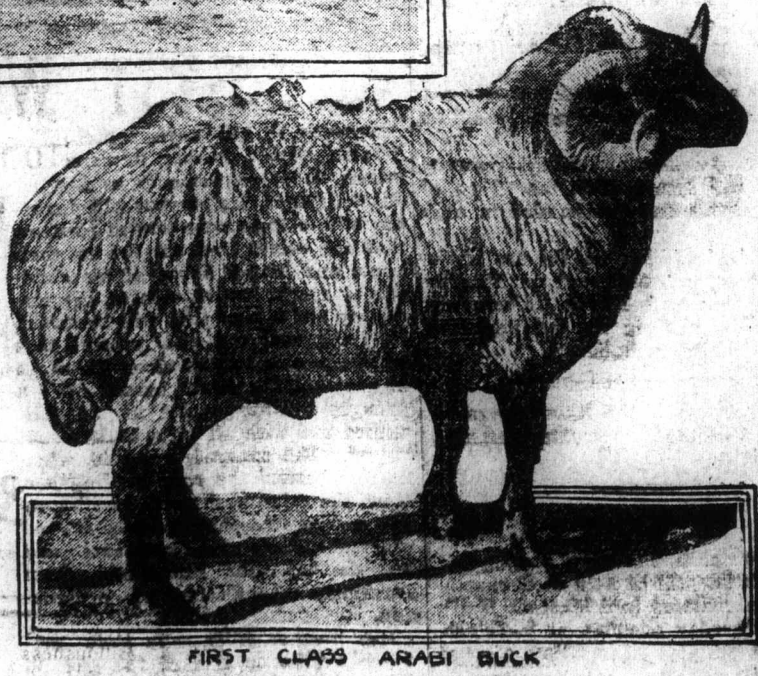


DR. YOUNG'S CARAVAN LEAVING TASHKENT, WEST TURKESTAN

C. Young, of Belen, Texas, physician and breeder of fancy sheep, is in possession of the secret of the breeding of the lambs from which is taken the Persian lamb fur.

Dr. Young began his work at the investigation of the United States Department of Agriculture. To-day there are seventeen animals of the right kind distributed among the ranches of Dr. Young, Captain Charles de Brémont, of Howell, N. M., and the government experimental station.

In five years, Dr. Young declares, American women will be wearing Persian lamb skins raised in their own country, and in a few more years America will be exporting the skins.

**Rev. W. J. Smith, Formerly of Colborne Street Church, Speaks on "The Modern Shirt."**

One of the most stirring arrays of modern vice ever made in Hamilton emanated from the pulpit of the Charlton Avenue Methodist Church Sunday morning, when the pastor, Rev. W. J. Smith, formerly of Brantford, who soon leaves to associate with the province reform work throughout the province, spoke on the white slave traffic and gave a specific instance of this deadly "cultured anarchy" as he termed it.

"I wish I could gather together in this church some of these women who walk the street and whom we know are pure within the law," he declared, "those who are at the height of fashion, wearing skirts that appeal to the sensual minds of men. They are clean, yet they take the place of unclean women by the very fashion of the dress they wear. On the streets and on the street cars we must hear the things that are said about them as they parade up and down the highways. You women do not hear and thank God you don't, else you would hide your heads in shame. The men of Hamilton cry to you this morning, 'Help, help, help! will you not help us to help ourselves—help that men may be re-

strained from evil by the appearance of clean womanhood on the streets."

Mr. Smith made a slashing attack on employers and others who paid girls so little wages that they were forced, advised by their employers to live a life of shame to secure more money.

He also blamed parents for expecting too much financial assistance from their children, and for not telling them of the snares in modern business.

"This mock modesty is the cause of a large portion of white slavery to-day," he declared.

He also alluded to the present criminal legislation in Canada. Before a woman fell, he said, her evil deed was not considered conclusive, as it reveals her freedom and corresponding opportunities and glory. Lastly he dealt with Man's Future of immortality through Christ as it brightens his prospect, and makes possible enduring service.
