

If good rains come within the next few days it is estimated that 75 per cent. of the crops will be saved otherwise It is estimated that 15 per cent. u., the crops will be saved, otherwise crops are likely to be light and short. Spring plowing and stubble lands will be poor, but the summer fallow and breaking and plowing are stand-ing the dry spell well. In the south-ern part of the province the outlook is uncertain and farmers are getting anxious. There have been high winds in this part which have dam-aged the light land to some extent. Damage from cutworms is reported to be slight. Whether this district will have a fair crop or a poor one depends on whether the rain comes during the next few days.



Moscow, Friday, June 14.—(By the Associated Press)—Czecho-Slo-vak control of sections of the Trans-Siberian railway has completely cut all rail and wire communications between Siberia and Russia and has resulted in deoriving European Rus-sla of the Siberian grain supply. The conflict between the Ozecho-Slovak forces and the Soviet Gov-ernment, began May 26, when the Savists attempted to enforce the order of Leen Trotsky minister of war, to disarm all the Czecho-Slovak forces on their way to Viadi-vostok for transportation over-seas. Clashes occurred at a num-ber of points. The Czecho-Slovak organizations originally numbered about 40,000 men. Of these nearly 20,000 reached Viadivostok. The remainder, involved in an effort to resist disarmament are chief-ly centred about Tchelyabinsk.
