SALE OF FRUIT

Those who sell fruit by the box, basket or barrel this year will have to be careful about putting the best of it on top. The law is very strict, and the inspectors have been instructed to hustle around and enforce it. No fruit dealer can tell when an inspector will drop down upon him. The following is the clause in the Dominion Fruit Marks' act bearing upon the question: "No person shall sell, or offer, expose or have in his possession for sale, any fruit packed in any package in which the face or shown surface gives a false representation of the contents of such package; and it shall be considered a false representation when more than fifteen per cent of such fruit is substantially smaller in size than, or inferior in grade to, or different in variety from, the face or shown surface on such package." The penalty for selling, or offering for sale dishonest fruit, are described above, is not less than 25 cents, nor more than \$1 for each package sold or exposed for sale, with the costs of prosecution added. Besides all this the inspector will label the fruit "Falsely Marked," and any person who offends this will have to shell out \$50 and costs. It looks as if fruit will have to be sold on its merits this year.

PARLIAMENT

The Autumn Session Will Begin About the Middle of October.

London, July 7. — In the House of Commons this afternoon, A. J. Balfour, the government leader, announced that an autumn session of Parliament would be necessary, beginning about the middle of October, and that the House would adjourn early in August.

Replying to a question on the subject of the coronation stands, the first commissioner of works, A. Akers Douglas, said it was not proposed to remove them, as it was hoped they would still be required for the purpose for which they were constructed.

THE RUSTICATION OF CADETS.

Winston Spencer Churchill, Conservative, and Ivor Churchill Guest, Conservative, raised the question of the "rustication" of the cadets of the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, as a result of their failure to denounce the persons guilty of starting the recent fires at that institution.

The War Secretary, Mr. Broderick, after narrating the facts already known, said the rusticated cadets would lose terms of seniority. No charge had been formulated against individuals, but the cadets who had left Sandhurst all belonged to companies whose quarters had been set on fire. Some of them had been seen entering a room shortly before one of the fires. There was, therefore, good reason to believe that several cadets were implicated in the unfortunate business. The commander-in-chief, Lord Roberts, considered that the safety of the college demanded the adoption of stringent measures.
