SALE OF FRUIT

Those who sell fruit by the box, basket or barrel this year will have to be careful about putting the best of it on top. The law is very strict, and the inspectors have been instructed to hustle around and enforce it. No fruit dealer can tell when an inspector will drop down upon him. The following is the clause in the Dominion Fruit Marks' act bearing upon the question:
"No person shall sell, or offer, expose
or have in his possession for sale, any fruit packed in any package in which the faced or shown surface gives . false representation of the contents of such package; and it shall be conof such package; and it shall be con-sidered a false representation when more than fifteen per cent of such fruit is substantially smaller in size than, or inferior in grade to, or different in variety from, the faced or shown surface on such package." The penalty for selling, or offering for sale dishonest fruit, are described after na the inspector will label the fruit "Falsely Marked," and any person who obliterates this will have to shell
