THE COMING FUEL.

The Oshawa Vindicator draws a dark picture of what would happen to the business of Ontario in case of the failure—from any cause—of the coal supply, and says:

Is there a remedy—any substitute for fuel? Thank God there is. Between the mouth of the Ottawa and the Lake of the Woods there are three hundred rivers in Ontario. And every one of these rivers flows down a slope with such rapids and falls as could furnish unlimited power with which to generate heat, which can be transmitted fully two hundred miles. These rivers were very likely busy flowing in grandeur and beauty among the picturesque forests of our beautiful Ontario before Grandpa Adam cut up his foolish diodes in the Garden of Eden, and they will most likely flow on till time shall cease to be.

Greater than all, and vastly more accessible than all flows Niagara. Its strength defies imagination. Each cataract and fall on every one of these hundreds of rivers holds out a standing challenge to the genius of man to undertake the development of marvellous strength.

The day is coming shortly when nearly every factory in Canada, and the United States will be turned by power from some water fall.

But the point we wish to make just now is that Ontario is peculiarly isolated from coal fields. At the same time she has more water falls and cataracts than any other country on the earth. Water power can be used to generate heat. Soon war or scarcity of fuel in the United States may cut off our present precarious supply.

We have no desire to make a point for our political party out of this matter, but it can be justly and truly said that the provincial government is doing nothing in the matter of developing power for this or other purposes.

CANADA'S OPPORTUNITIES.

Rev. Dr. Carman has lost none of his old-time eloquence and fire. Nor has his grasp of public affairs and his comprehension of the needs of this young country lost any of the firmness and broadness that characterized them of yore. What could be finer or more to the point than the following from his address at the Methodist Conference in Winnipeg recently:

"Turning our attention to our own Dominion, what do we see? We behold a national phenomenon of prime importance, one of the grandest political opportunities of all the centuries; an open area for one of the most stupendous migrations of races in the annals of time. As in the discovery of America, as in the opening of Africa, this has not a little to do with the coming of the Kingdom of God, and the responsibility is ours. Politically, socially, religiously, the burden of responsibility—a large share of the burden of responsibility—is upon the very men, the very conference and church representative assembly I see before me. This Conference, gathered in Winnipeg, at the gateway of this opening domain, at this juncture of the growth of the Dominion, has everything to do with the future of these mighty movements; mighty as the rising tides of population in the United States one hundred years ago; mighty as the influx of peoples into Australia or South Africa in our own time. History, experience, observation, national prospect and hope, connective loyalty, and adoption, patriotism and religion combine to urge upon us the chance and duty of this hour. The church of God must at least, keep abreast the racial migrations, and be with the people when they are laying the foundations of state and throne, when they are building constitution and government, and when they are framing institutions and laws."

CANADA'S TRUE POLICY.

The bulk of the protectionists of 1878 sought to use a high tariff as a means to an end, the end being the compelling of Uncle Sam to renew the reciprocity treaty. Ostrich feathers are plucked for the market as follows: A man carefully examines the flock and picks out those birds whose feathers are ripening, groups them into dozens and pens them in so that they cannot run about and injure their beautiful plumage. When the plucking time comes each bird is enticed into a narrow, dark passageway. The entrances are then closed and the bird thus imprisoned. A cloth bag is thrown over the creature's head. Then the plucking begins. Three men, perched upon platforms outside of the pen, reach over the board enclosure and, with various scissor-like appliances, pluck off the feathers. What ever wounds a bird may receive are immediately dressed. The tail feathers are pulled and not cut, simply because they reproduce better than other feathers of the ostrich. While the plucking is in progress the ostrich keeps up a dismal roaring. Were it not for the stanch construction of the pen, the creature would kick the boards into splinters.
