

A MODIFIED HOME RULE

Irish Landlords Favor Constitution of Financial Council.

Important Scheme Outlined For Elective Body to Administer the Annual Expenditure of the \$30,000,000 Granted Annually-Statutory Body Suggested te Deal With All Private Bill Legislation Affecting Ireland.

London, Sept. 26 .- The report of the committee on organization of the hish Reform Association, which was adopted at a meeting presided over by Lord Dunrayen, at Dublin, on Friday, was issued last night. The report outlines an important scheme for the devolution of the Irish Government in finance and local business. It suggests the constitution of an Irish financial council, composed of twenty-four members, under the presidency of the Lord Lieutenant, and with the Chief Secretary for Iraland as vice-president, twelve members to be elected by groups of existing Parking and the Chief Secretary for Iraland as vice-president, twelve members to be elected by groups of existing Parking ing Parliamentary constituencies at twelve to be nominated by the Crown; one-third of the members to

retire every three years.

The functions of the council will be to administer the \$30,000,000 expended annually on 1rish services. Parliament, however, retaining a controlling power enabling the liouse of Common's to reverse the council's decisions. The report further sug-gests that a statutory body should be created, consisting of Irish re-presentative peers and Irish members of the House of Commons, in addition to the proposed financial coun-cil, and to which should be delegated oll private bill legislation affecting Ireland and any other Irish business that might be referred to it by Parliament.

The report concludes by the sub-mission of its proposals to a Royal Commission.

REDMOND PRAISES BLAKE.

No Man More Respectfully Listened to By Men of All Parties.

DAWSON CITY A SUFFERER

Yukon Capital Has Quarter-Millon Blaze -U.S. Cities Lose Reavily.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 26.—A special despatch from Dawson to The Seattle Times and Puget Sound American says: "The largest fire since 1899 occurred here Friday night. The loss is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars, with no insurance. The fire originated in the kitchen of the Cecil Hotel, formerly the McDonthe Cecil Hotel, formerly the McDon-ald Hotel, at the corner of Queen and Second avenues, and swept both Queen street between Second and Third avenues, as far south as the McDonald Trading Co. at Second avenue, and on to the Westminster House at Third avenue. The fire department pulled down several structures on the north, preventing further spread of the flames.
Steel Works Suffer.

Bethlehem, Pa., Sept. 26.—Fire Saturday night, caused by furnace sparks, completely destroyed the structural building at the Bethlehem Steel Works, together with the paint, car, carpenter and pattern shops. The loss probably will reach \$250,000.

Four Children Burned.

Winchester, Ky., Sept. 26.—Four children of George Cooper, ranging from 2 to 7 years in age, who were left alone by their parents, perished in a fire which destroyed their home Saturday night.

University Destreyed. Minneapolis, Sept. 26.—The main building of the University of Minnesota was destroyed by fire Saturday, entailing a loss of \$115,000; fully covered by insurance.

School in Flames.

Boston, Sept. 26.—St. Augustine's Parochial School, South Boston, was burned Saturday. Loss, \$150,000. Loss About \$75,000.

MODIFICATION OR PROTEST.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—Foreign Minister Count Lamsdorff has, it is announced, wired instructions to Count Benckendorff, the Russian Ambassador to Great Britain, to confer with Foreign Secretary Lord Lansdowne, with a view to securing a modification of the Anglo-Thibetan treaty, which has not been ratified by China.

Count Benckendorff is authorized by these instructions to lodge a strong protest if Great Britain refuses to consider Russia's objections to the treaty, which, it is understood, referred exclusively to Article IX. ef the draft of the convention.

ROOSEVELT THE PEACEMAKER.

Will Ask Nations of World For Second

Washington, Sept. 26.—President Roosevelt announced Saturday that at an early date he would ask the nations of the world to join in a second congress at The Hague for the promotion of arbitration.

The occasion of the announcement was the reception by the President of the delegates of the Inter-Parliamentary Union, which recently held a session at St. Louis.

American Steamer Seized.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 26.—The American steamer Alert of Bellingham, and two large scows, one of them loaded with salmon and \$1,000 worth of nets, have been seized by the Ruth, a Dominion Government fisheries protection steamer. The fisheries protection steamer. The value of the property seized is about \$15,000. The authorities allege that the American boat was poaching on fisheries 125 miles from the American boundary. The seized steamer has been brought to this port.

May Come At Any Time.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 26.—On Saturday, 700 members of the Allied Mechanical Trades Union employed by the C.P.R. went out on strike. by the C.P.R. went out on strike. Their action has no bearing upon the situation as regards to carmen, but it is said that within a few days the demands of the men will either have been agreed to or 2,000 employes of the company, representing the entire staff employed in the car shops from St. John te Vancouver, will be senting. wanting.

Polish Tongue Under Ban.

Berlin, Sept. 26.—One of the most stringent enactments ever issed by the Prussian Government against the the Prussian Government against the Poles has just been promulgated. Some time ago schoolmasters were prohibited from using the Polish language in school hours, but the latest ukase warns them against using Polish outside of school hours in communicating with their families or at social gatherings.

Mining Town Swept Away.

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 26.—Floods in Chihuahua, Mexico, have destroyed Cushihuriachiae, a mining town in the interior of the State. Every house was swept away, but no lives were lost. An ore train from that camp that took two weeks to reach Chihuahua on account of the high water, brough the first news of the destruction.
