Editorial Notes.

The Crop Prospects.

The provincial crop report for year 1898 has been issued by the secretary for agriculture.

Nine reports were received from this county covering the districts of Aylesford, Grand Pre, Hillston, Coldbrook, East Cornwallis, Church Street, West Cornwallis, Brooklyn Street and Lakeville and Wolfville.

The potato crop promises a full average; oats and other grains above an average.

The general character of the season in this county as regards earliness or lateness and growth of crops is described as follows: Grand Pre—Later than usual on account of excessive rain;

"The season was rather cold and backward at first and seed was not put in the ground very early.

General stock was turned out to grass from May 1st to 15th, according to locality, and dairy cows from 23rd May to June 1st.

"In the apple orchards the fruit has not set well in this district, especially Ribblesdale and Blenheim, which will be nearly a total failure.

Apple orchards blossomed abundantly. Up-favorable weather just at the time the apples were being formed turned the scale against a large crop of fruit.

East Cornwallis, O. C. Chase: "Apple orchards blossomed abundantly. Up-favorable weather just at the time the apples were being formed turned the scale against a large crop of fruit.

West Cornwallis, H. J. Chase: "The cold east wind at the time of apple blossom, caused, I think, some kinds to blight, notably Ribblesdale, Blenheim, etc., were a little earlier, and those later seemed to be better.

Hillston, Herbert Stairs: "Looking well, but did not set as full as expected."

Grand Pre, Dr. Chipman: "Immense blossoming; but fruit has not set well with the exception of pear, cherries, plums and apples will average probably 25 per cent. better than last year, which was the lightest crop in ten years."

Coldbrook, P. Lewis: "Fair; fruit did not set well on account of cold and damp weather, but is now maturing satisfactorily."

Church Street, E. J. Armstrong: "Some varieties setting well, others a failure."
