Wolfville Board of Trade.

An important meeting of the Council of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held on Tuesday afternoon at the Council Chamber, at which it was decided to affiliate with the Western Board of Trade, Messrs. J. E. Hales, C. M. Gormley and Edson Graham were appointed representatives to attend the meeting of the latter organization, which takes place at Bridgetown to day.

Prof. Colt laid before the meeting the plans which he had prepared at the request of the authorities of the D. A. R. of the plot of land near the station which it is proposed to convert into a park for the town. The management of the railway ask that the town undertake the cost of preparing the land and offer to furnish all plants and shrubs necessary. It was decided to bring the matter before the Board at the next meeting for action.

Plans were made for holding the annual meeting of the Board on Friday evening, Jan. 19th, when it is hoped there may be a full attendance of citizens as a number of matters of importance to the welfare of the town are to come up for consideration.

Union Service Resolutions.

At the union meeting of the Baptists, Methodists and Presbyterians, held in the Presbyterian church on Thursday evening, Jan. 4th, the following set of resolutions was unanimously passed:—

1. That we acknowledge the benefit which has come to the towns and rural districts of the province through the application of the provisions of the N. S. Temperance Act to the city of Halifax.

2. That we appreciate the splendid efforts of the temperance workers of our capital city, and especially of the Halifax Temperance Alliance, in their endeavors to make the Act effective and operative.

3. That we pledge ourselves to support any legitimate effort to secure (a) government enforcement of the N. S. Temperance Act.

(b) the enactment of a law by the Federal Parliament absolutely prohibiting the importation of intoxicating liquors, for beverage purposes, into such provinces as have prohibited their sale, and

(c) Dominion wide prohibition for the period of the war, and for as long a time thereafter as a majority referendum shall determine.

Willow Bank Cemetery.

The annual meeting of the Willow Bank Cemetery will be held in the Town Hall on Monday, the 22nd day of January, at 3 o'clock p.m. This meeting will be of great importance to all who are interested in the cemetery.

Within the past eighteen months the cemetery grounds have been thoroughly cleaned and renovated. All new ground of about four acres has been broken up and leveled so as to be prepared for the addition of new lots. New bylaws have been prepared which await the sanction of the lot owners at the annual meeting. A new system has been adopted for the care and upkeep of the cemetery. Perpetual care of the cemetery is the aim of the directors. A hearty co-operation on the part of the lot holders is urged by the directors.

The County Councils and the Patriotic Fund.

EIGHT HUNDRED THOUSAND REQUIRED FOR 1917—THE SHARE OF THE COUNTIES IN THIS.

This week in Nova Scotia counties the County Councils will be discussing the size of the grant to be made for 1917 to the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

It will be of much importance to the Fund if the Councilors should have full confidence that the people will heartily approve of liberal grants. We have no doubt that the ratepayers of the Province are behind the fund to whatever extent may be necessary. For 1917, owing to the increasing size of the Canadian armies, the demands of the fund on Nova Scotia will reach eight hundred thousand dollars. But this is more than we raised for 1916, so it will be necessary that we contribute even more liberally than in the past.

The work the fund is doing in caring for the families of the men at the front must not be hindered by lack of money, and we suggest to all patriotic citizens that they take every opportunity of encouraging the County Councilors to see that the sum voted level up to the standard of the best paying counties in the Province. In Ontario a revenue of \$120,000 a month collected from the rates or nearly one add a half million dollars for the year, is being received from County Councils representing rural districts. Practically every County Council in Nova Scotia has already voted and paid some amount to the Patriotic Fund. There is perhaps no fairer way of spreading over all the people in the rural districts their share of the burden of carrying the fund than is afforded by County Council taxation, and we should be too proud to let any other part of the Province bear a larger proportion than we are bearing, and certainly too proud to let any other province help out Nova Scotia in doing what, after all, is its simple duty.

An Interesting Wedding.

Many residents of Wolfville and vicinity will be interested to learn of the marriage of Capt. John G. McKay, of Little Branch, N. B., to Annie Robina McKee, of Black River, N. S.

The wedding took place on Christmas day, at the home of Mr. Frederick McDougall, 316 5th Avenue, N. E. Calgary, Alberta. The affair was quiet and simple, with a few relatives and intimate friends from the home district in New Brunswick present. Rev. Mr. McNichol, a Presbyterian minister, formerly of New Brunswick and a friend of the bride's, officiated at the ceremony.

Mrs. McKay has taught in the West for several years, during which time she has been principal of the central public school at Red Deer, Alberta. She maintains a high standing among the teachers of Alberta, and is well known throughout the province. Mr. McKay has long been honored in honour and affection in Nova Scotia, and particularly in Wolfville and vicinity. After gaining a wealth of practical experience from co-operation with farmers, dredgers and lumbermen in New Brunswick and in Pennsylvania, he came to Acadia Academy to prepare himself for college. For two years he held the important position as House Master of the Academy. During his college course 'J. G.' as he was familiarly known, came to be one of the best loved and generally honoured men in the institution. As president of the Y. M. C. A., as chairman of the Students' Council, as editor of the "Athenaeum," as captain of the football team and track athlete, as all-round student of conspicuous ability and inspiring and conserving influence, he made for himself an enviable record. In original ability he was above the average, and showed no mean talent in verse writing. At his graduation in May, 1915, he was one of four speakers chosen to represent his class. During last year he studied in the Divinity School of Harvard University. It was with difficulty, however, that he yielded to his advisers, and remained at study throughout the year while the call of his country sounded loud in his ears. And so, when the year closed he returned immediately to Nova Scotia and gave himself with characteristic devotion to the work of the Y. M. C. A. at Aldershot Camp.

Soon after the closing of the Camp in October he received his commission for overseas Y. M. C. A. service and for the past weeks has been in the vicinity of Toronto raising funds for work of his department.

Immediately after his marriage Capt. McKay returned to the East, inasmuch as he expects to sail for Europe in the very near future. Mrs. McKay, during her husband's absence, will continue her teaching at Red Deer.

Returning to Nova Scotia.

The Rev. W. M. Ryan, who has been supplying at Red Deer, Alberta, for the past two years and who previously to that was pastor of the Windsor Methodist church, is expecting to return to the Nova Scotia Conference this coming summer, he having accepted an invitation to Horton circuit, to take effect at the commencement of next conference year.

Mr. Ryan's many friends will be pleased to welcome him back again, he being well and favorably known throughout the conference.
